FROM CONTINGENT FUND
FOR SPECIALLY NEEDY
SCHOOLS

FELTON IS ACTIVE

County Superintendent of Education Procures Nice Slice of Revenue for Anderson.

Through the instrumentality of County Superintendent of Education J. B. Felton, the sum of \$3,621 has been secured for several specially needy schools in the county of Anderson. This money is secured from the contingent fund for specially needy schools provided for in Section 2, Item 6 of the appropriation of 1915.

The money has been forwarded to the treasurer of Anderson county, and will be paid out by him upon the order of the county superintendent of education.

LARGE AUDIENCE

Gathered Despite the Rain and Thoroughly Enjoyed the Interesting Program.

Despite the inclemency of the weather, a large crowd of people from Honea Path, Williamston, Anderson and Belton gathered at the opera house in Belton last night for the fifth meeting of the O'Neal Oratorical Association.

This contest was postponed from last Friday when the bad weather made it undesirable to hold the contest. The contest was a close one, and the spirit of rivalry among the schools was manifested in the cheering of each school as its candidate took the stand.

The winners of the contest were: Girls, First Prize—Miss Nellie Williamson, representing the Belton High School. Her subject was "The Black Horse and His Rider."
Girls, Second Prize—Miss Llewellyn French, representing Honea Path High School. Her subject was, "Hagar."

Boys, First Prize—Herbert Hammond, representing Williamston High School. His subject was, "Cassius to Brutus."
Boys, Second Prize—Eugene Moore, representing the Anderson High School. His subject was, "The Folly of War."

Judges of the oratorical contest were: Rev. Robert G. Lee, of Greenville, C. T. Gause, P. C. Montgomery, and H. C. Busch, all of Atlanta, Ga. The medals were delivered by Rev. Lee, who made a very appropriate little talk before awarding the medals.

All baseball and basket ball games were called off on account of the bad weather. This is the first of these contests that has ever been held without having the baseball and basket ball games fought out by the schools before the contest, which is held at night.

The Jitneys Are Coming.

In the May American Magazine Hugh S. Fullerton writes an exceedingly interesting little fact article entitled, "The Jitneys Are Coming." Following is a brief extract:

"Today Jitney busses are running in almost every large city in the West and Central West, and lines are being started everywhere. The latest reports indicate that there are between 8,000 and 9,000 licensed Jitneys operating in these cities. There are 200 in Los Angeles alone, nearly 500 in San Francisco, New Orleans is in the hands of the Jitney-Denver, Washington, Salt Lake, Milwaukee, Toledo, and not Chicago and Washington. The conquering hosts of Jitney busses have swept eastward, overwhelming the entire country and, incidentally, bringing with them new municipal problems that may prove as hard to solve as were the old ones."

"The two big problems are congestion of streets and danger of injury. In Kansas City the traffic police and others declare that the Jitneys do not congest traffic as much as street cars do, and are easier to handle. Los Angeles already is complaining of congestion of the main downtown streets and danger to pedestrians and hoppers."

"It is evident that before the Jitneys are received as an established public service factor some liability insurance must be arranged. The Jitneys are operated chiefly by persons of small means, and the danger of personal injury of passengers is to be considered. The street car companies declare the proportion of passengers injured will be larger than in any other form of transportation, and that it will be practically impossible for injured passengers to recover damages."

Can There Ever Be Too Many Apples?

In the current issue of Farm and Fireside a contributor, writing about the apple market, says in part:

"Ever since I was a boy I have heard this overproduction talk, yet I can not recall a single instance where any great calamity has resulted from too much of any one staple, especially if it is good to eat."

"During my boyhood days back in Kansas I made a solemn vow that when I became a man I was going to raise all the fruit I could eat and have a surplus for those who do not ordinarily get it. It seems like the older I get the more fruit I want. I believe it true with most of us."

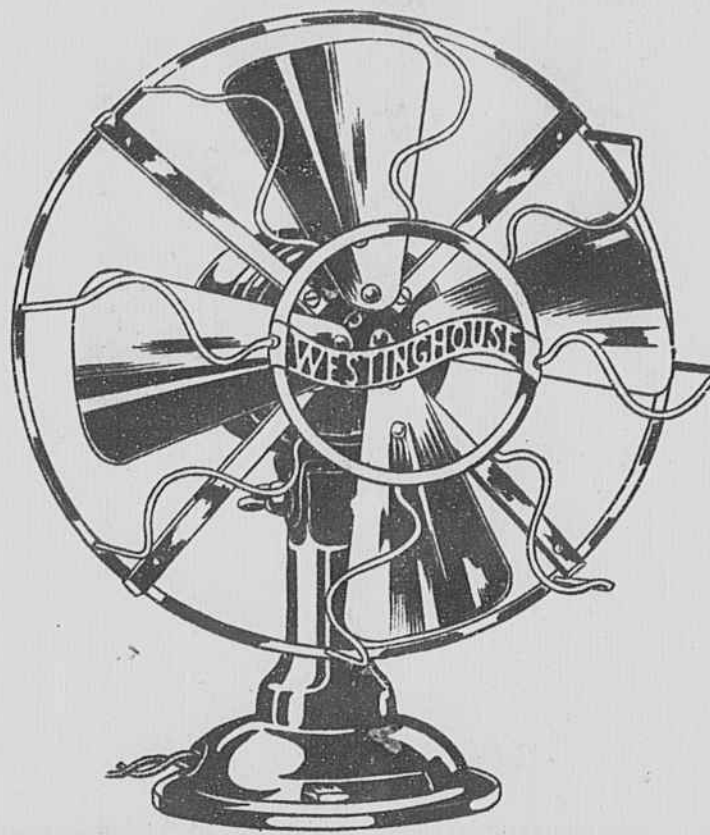
"What if we do raise 125,000 carloads of apples in 1919? Counting 500 boxes per car, that gives us 62,500,000. This is a whole lot less than a box apple, not counting what will be shipped abroad."

"The poor are obliged to do without fruit most of the year, and that isn't right."

"I expect to raise better fruit than the other fellow, and I believe that well-colored, fine-flavored apples will always sell. There may be lots of them, but we shall learn how to distribute them."

German Chancellor Grows Fat on War.

This is the last authentic photograph of the big German chancellor, showing violent contrast with those taken of him before the war. Then said to be six feet four inches tall—he was a thin, gaunt man—his body much resembling that of Abraham Lincoln.

But this photograph was taken very recently. It is a snapshot of the most important man in Germany, with the single exception of the Kaiser, at the head of a parade in

the recent Bismarck birthday celebration. It proves he has filled out much and now must weigh considerably over 200 pounds.

Such has been the effect of war on Germany's leading statesman. He has not grown thin and worried by the strain. The Kaiser in recent photographs shows the strain in white hair and deeper lines in his face. While Bethmann-Hollweg has aged a little, he has not worried. His photograph proves that.

Every once in a while the fighting in Europe stops to let a czar or a king or an emperor hang a medal on a general.

If they keep on in Mexico they will get the seats for gentlemen who are presidents emeritus rather badly crowded.
