

MAKES RECORD IN ATHE-LETICS AT UNIVERSITY **OF CHICAGO** 

MILE 1:55 2-5

Made Mile Run in 4:29 in West-Intercollegiate

From time to time Anderson people have heard of the record which Leroy Campbell, of this city, who is Leroy Campbell, of this city, who is a student at the Chicago University, is making in the world of athletics. Mr. Campbell recently set a new record for the mile run in the West-ern Intercollegiate Conference, run-ning it indoors in 4.29. Last Satur-day Mr. Campbell established a new mark in the half mile avent making.

mark in the half mile event, making the distance in 1:552-5, which was 1-5 of a second better than the previous record.

Breaking two conference records and trying another, the Maroons de-feated the Purdue track team yester-day afternoon at Sage field, scoring 78 points to a total of 38 registered by the Boiler-makers.

Captain Ward lowered the mark in

the low hurdles, clipping a second off the time of 0:24 4-5 set by Poague of Illinois.

Roy Campbell established a new mark in the half-mile event, doing the distance in 1:55 2-5, one-fifth of a second better than the record hung up last year by Henderson of Illinois. Dewey Knight ran the century in :09 4-5, which equaled the present conference mark.

The 100-yard dash was a slam of the Marcons, Dewey Knight equalling the Big Nine record of 0:094-5 sec-onds for the event, and being followed across by Agar and Birancik. The Midway runners repeated the feat in the "220," Knight again leading with Breathed and Barancik neck-and-neck for second and third.

Joe Stout, the Maroon star in the mile run, ran a sensational race in that event, after he had fought back and forth with F. Campbell, the Purdue hope. Stout did the distance in 4:26 2-5. Campbell coming in fifteen yards behind him, with Merrill in


