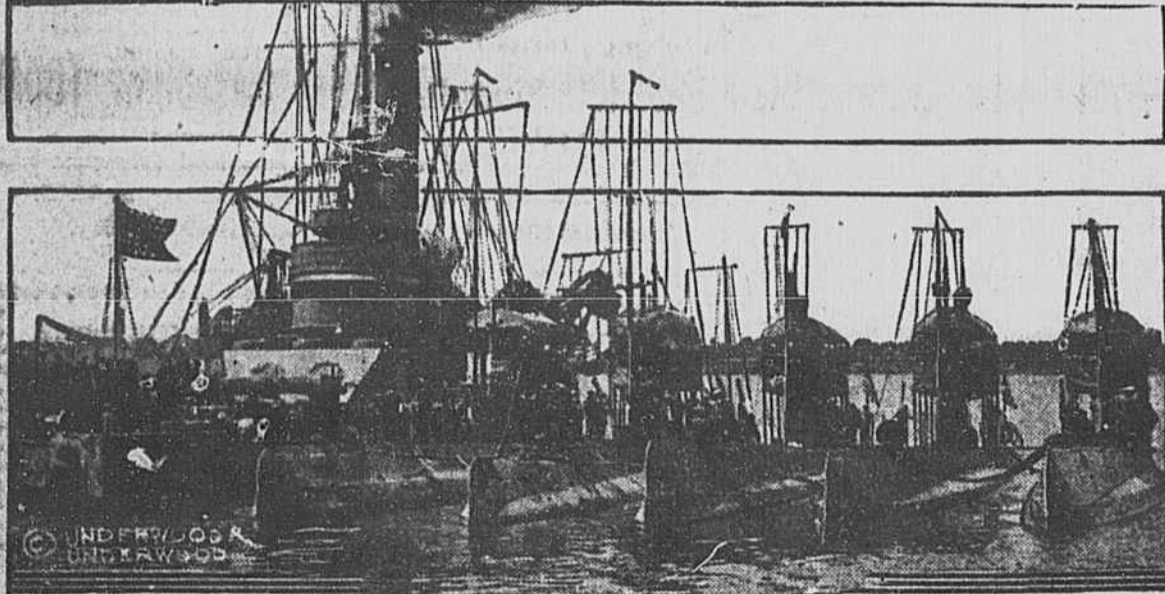

### Jumping 24 Feet 1 1/2 In.



### Phil Stiles.

Practically every track and field record on the books will be in danger when the athletes from all sections of the United States gather at San Francisco for the Panama-Pacific championships, early in August. No amateur performer in the list will be more closely watched than Phil Stiles, the broad jumper who wears the colors of the University of Wisconsin in college competition. Stiles gave the athletic sharps a taste of his mettle as a broad jumper, May 15, by making a tremendous jump of 24 feet 1 1/2 inches—the longest running leap made since A. L. Guttererson won the Olympic championship for the U. S. A. at Stockholm, three years ago.

Stiles is unquestionably one of the most remarkable young jumpers ever developed in this country. As a schoolboy he cleared 23 feet 9 inches, and he won the national broad jump championship from a big field, including Platt Adams of the New York Athletic Club, who is considered the greatest all around jumper in the world, before he was twenty years old. The accompanying cut shows Stiles in action—at the top of his "rise" and about to consummate his great leap by plunging his feet forward an instant before they hit the turf.
