GERMANS FIGHT HARD TO TAKE PRZEMYSL (CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE.)

ment tonight announced that several naval airmen made an air raid on Venice last night, dropping bombs. The bombs caused tires near the arsenal

London, May 29.—The Italian armies are drawing near Trent and Triest in Austria, the principal cities in the territory over which Italy, joined forces with the allies in the European war. Little news of the campaign permeates the rigid censorship; but Geneva dispatches say that the italians are still advancing.

Near Goritz, the Austrians quered determined resistance. In Triest, anti-Italian disorders are reported and tne municipal authorities are said to have fled.

The Austro-German advance in Ga ilcia are still being prosecuted with success, except for a Russian victory on the San river at Sieniawa. Vienna reports indicate that the maneuvers designed to isolate Przemysl, are procceding unchecked and that the for-tress soon may be surrounded.

In the Caucasus the Russians are now in possession of the city of Van. in Turkish Armenia they are steading advancing against the Turks.

Turkey now has aboua 80,000 soldiers on the Gallipoli peninsula, and is bringing up reinforcements from Syria, thus concentrating her efforts on the defense of Constantinople. On that account the offensive operations in the Caucasus have been abandoned army headquarters, dwell on the British advance toward L. Bassee, and a further French progress in the most difficult section of the Lens-Arras line. Near Reurie, a little to the north of Friar, a formidable German fortress bars the road to the castward. The bars the road to the eastward. The French hay, captured a part of this work which is known as "The Laby-rinth." The Germans are fighting stoutly to prevent the further pro gress of the allies there. They have made no less than seven sanguinary assaults on the new French position of Augres. Berlin reports that the battle at Ablain Stazaire is still raging.
