WILL EXAMINE ALL STATE INSTITUTIONS

Board of Charities and Corrections to Make Tour of Inspection During Summer.

Columbia, June 8.—An examination of all of the institutions in South Carolina over which it has visitatorial and advisory powers will be undertaken by the state board of charities and corrections before the summer ends. In order that the state may derive the greatest possible good from this examination of county jails, chain gangs and poor houses, as well as state penal, charitable and correctional institutions, the state board of charities and corrections and its officers are making a careful comparison of reports of boards of charities in other states to see what data they have found most useful in mapping out reforms in the management of institutions under their care. The South Carolina board has already made a preliminary study of the penitentiary and the state hospital for the insane. The board is closely in touch now with the board of regents of the hospital and is fully informed of the changes in management the regents are putting into effect. The state board of charities and corrections, after making its statewide survey of institutions of a penal, charitable and correctional character, expects to co-operate with the officials in charge of all of them in bringing about improvements in the conditions surrounding the inmates of these places and in undertaking any needed reforms in the system of managing them.

Albert S. Johnstone, secretary of the state board of charities and corrections, will visit especially successful boards of charities in other states to get a first-hand view of their methods of work.

BIG BATTLE IN GALICIA UNDECISIVE

allies is diminishing, says a Berlin dispatch to the Cologne Gazette. It says: "Rumania has rejected the first offer of the Triple Entente as unsatisfactory. Bulgaria has received offers from the Entente. It is not known that Bulgaria has formally rejected them, but she is in an agreement with Rumania and since latter has rejected the offers, Bulgaria probably will do likewise."

Rome, June 8.—The Italian army is proceeding methodically to take possession of important positions along the frontier, reports General Cadorna, Italian chief of staff. Reports that a closely contested artillery duel continues on the plateau of Lavaronne, Foglaria.

The Italian army is in close contact with the enemy from Caporetto to the sea. Beyond the Caporetto mountains, along heights and in valleys, Italians continue heavy fighting against Austrian positions on the opposite slope.

The Italians are reported to have gained a foothold on both banks of the Isonzo river. The Italians seriously threaten Tolmino.

The Italians succeeded in crossing the lower Isonzo. They are fortifying

positions on the east bank. Italian losses relatively light.

The Italian authorities are drawing tighter the screen of secrecy as to the Italian operations. Nevertheless, it may be said that masses of Italian troops have been concentrated on the roads from Cormans, Palmanova and Cervignano.

The resistance of the Austrians daily is becoming stronger. This Italian officer declares, has had the effect of making their men more determined.

Tolmino, on the east side of the Isonzo, is one of the Italian objectives.

Small Successes Claimed by Vienna.

Vienna, June 8.—The Austrian war office has issued the following statement in regard to operations against the Italians.

"In the southern war theatre our frontier troops have been successful in several minor engagements. The Italians appear to be pushing forward with strong forces against the Isonzo."

NOTE IS COMPLETE; WILL BE CABLED TO GERMANY TODAY

Hague agreement, particularly with those relating to marine warfare, designed to prevent the useless sacrifice of human life, it cannot discuss the application of the Hague agreement to the general aspects of Germany's war with Great Britain.

It will be further pointed out to the imperial government that the fundamental questions involved in the controversy between the two governments must take precedence over all other considerations.

U. S. Stands Firmly on Facts.

Germany's pleadings of facts to justify the acts of the commanders of her submarines in sinking the Lusitania and striking the American ships will be disposed of by a counter statement that the actual facts stated by the United States in the president's note of May 13 were presented only after an investigation through the proper government channels that permits of no question or dispute the "indubitable proof" offered by Germany to the contrary, notwithstanding.

Regarding the invitation of Germany to discuss the alleged violations of the laws of neutrality by the United States in permitting "armed ships" of hostile belligerent nations to leave American ports, Germany will be bluntly informed that the matter is one to be dealt with by the United States and not by Germany. The assurance is conveyed that the United States deems itself fully able to prevent such evasions of its laws and is thoroughly alive to its responsibilities in the premises.

A firm reply is made to the complaint of Germany that the United States has been aiding the allied nations at war with Germany by failing to protest against the blockading of German ports to cut off supplies for other than military purposes.

The president's note about to go forward states the position of the American government to be that the matter is not involved in the controversy between the two governments, and must wait until the fundamental issues are settled—the bona fide assurance that American lives and interests will be respected in the future, and substantial compensation and honorable amends for the sets of depredation already committed.

Will Take up British Problem.

Germany is given direct assurances that when the plain issues between

the two governments are adjusted to the satisfaction of the United States, this government will pass upon the right of Great Britain to cut off American ships from trading with Germany.

Answering the implication that the United States has evaded its responsibility in this matter, the assurance is given that the American government will proceed as far as international law and the demands of humanity will permit.

Answering a further grievance of Germany, as set forth in Herr von Jagow's evasive reply to the president's first communication, assurance will be given Germany that the United States may renew its proposals of good offices, submitted in February to Berlin and London, with a view to paving the way for a modus vivendi for the conduct of marine warfare between Germany and Great Britain, which were rejected by London and accepted by Berlin.

The offer was inspired by the humane purposes of the United States to provide a way for the shipment to German ports of foodstuffs and other supplies for the relief of the civil population of Germany and Austria.

Germany First Must Concede. But overshadowing all other features of the note will be the painstaking purpose of the president to convince Germany, without further argument, that there can be no basis for future negotiations of any sort until the imperial government squarely meets the issues raised by the United States, and presented in the most friendly spirit.

This attitude, in a sense, is interpreted to indicate a situation closely approaching a cessation of relations between Washington and Berlin, pending the final and satisfactory adjustment of the issues that lie between them.

It is probable that there will be no new undertakings of an official character until the president's note going Berlinward within a few hours has provoked Germany into a declaration of principles to be observed in future relations between the two governments.

VILLA IS WILLING TO CONCLUDE PEACE

Efforts to Meet Carranza In Peace Conference Attracts Official Attention.

Washington, June 8.—United States officials today displayed keen interest in Villa's efforts to meet Carranza in a conference to consider President Wilson's recent note demanding a settlement of Mexican affairs.

Officials believe this move of Villa's is the most important Mexican development since the president's communication. It is unofficially reported Villa has decided to propose a truce pending the conference and thus prevent further sacrifice of life in Mexico, which might produce intervention. Villa's secretary reports that Obregon attacked Villa's troops, when Villa ordered a retirement, in line with a truce suggestion.

Villa's action is the first step by Mexican leaders toward composing the Mexican trouble since the president's warning.

Consul Silliman also reported that a relief train which went yesterday to bring refugees from Mexico City, was under the direction of the British consul at Vera Cruz and carried the British flag. An armed escort was ordered for the train when it reached Apizaco.

Dispatches from American consuls at various points today detailed the food situation. Some reported an immediate need for relief supplies, while others reported short supplies and prohibitive prices.

FIRST MACHINERY EXHIBIT IN SOUTH

At Southern Textile Exposition to Be Held at Greenville Next November.

Greenville, June 8.—The Southern Textile Exposition which will be held in Greenville November 4th, 5th and 6th will be the first machinery exhibit of its kind held in the South, and will be one of the largest gatherings, if not the largest gathering of practical cotton mill men ever convened in this section. The Southern Textile association, under whose auspices this exhibit will be held, has a membership of twelve hundred or more, and the expectation is that at least two-thirds of this membership will be present. In addition to the members Greenville will have as her guests on this occasion representatives of various cotton mill supply houses, and practical workers who are not members of the organization. Matters relative to the entertainment of visitors, and details as to the exhibits and so on, will be announced from time to time as they are perfected.
