SYNOPSIS OF SERMON PREACHED LAST NIGHT

FOR ONE HOUR—ASSERTED SOME STARTLING TRUTHS

IN TENT TONIGHT

Sermons Tonight Will Be Conducted in Tent Near Post-office at 8:15 O'clock.

For one hour Rev. B. F. McLenon held a great congregation at St. John's church last night with a rapid fire, blistering, peeling sermon. He did not preach before the people but to the people. He told them how sin had broken his mother's heart and blighted his father's hope and made his home a hell and degenerated him into a vagabond. In his characteristic way he beat the pulpit with his flat and wheeled around to the choir said: "I don't want to hear any of you ossified, ossified, frizzly heads commenting on the language I use. I know that I make mistakes and I am sorry for it, but eight years ago I knew only one verse in the Bible. I was an uncouth, vicious gambler and God saved me and called me to preach and I am doing the best for God I can with the help I have. I am grabbing up anything that I can command and am throwing it at the devil."

His text was from John 17: 1, "The Hour is Come." The following is a synopsis of his sermon: "I am here preaching to you a living, reigning Christ, a Christ that they couldn't keep in the dirt, who sits at the right hand of God. Not a dead Christ, but a living Christ that can live to our uttermost. The hour is come that we should realize that the crisis is here. I believe that you are in as you have never seen in all your lives before. I believe that God will manifest himself in this town, and that hundreds will be swept into the kingdom. If right and decency and truth triumph, there will be such a Godsent, heaven-born regeneration time as you have never seen. But if hell and the devil triumph, this will be a good town to get out of. A lot of people are looking on the church as the end, instead of a means to the end. I will tell you sir, the churches are not dropped down on corners to entertain the people; the church is not a mutual congratulatory society or social endeavor or a third rate amusement bureau. You are not in the church to keep a little space seventeen inches square warm but to fight for Jesus Christ, and if you are not doing that then you are a curse. When I was a pastor as long as I preached Little Willie has gone to heaven, etc., I was a great preacher to them. But when I poured out the naked truth upon them they broke the speed limit to the presiding elder. I tell you it is time for us preachers to get down to business. Three-fourths of the preaching of today does not excite one emotion for good or bring one shadow of condemnation. It does not kill. You have got to shell the woods for God and give the devil the best run for his money. My heart's cry tonight is back to the Bible and I cry in my heart back to the supernatural. Away with the sickly sentimental trash that we see all about us these days. Back from this kid-glove, devil-concocted stomp of today. Back from the damning, soul-withering, worldly embellishments and human reasonings that have been instituted in the place of the Holy Ghost, and let us have that old time ear-stopping, limb-straightening, jaw-unlocking, tongue-untying power that glorifies God, a power that will empty the sepulchres, break the chains, and take off the hands and let the captive go free. A power that will make the liar a truthful man, the drunkard a sober man, the debauchee a clean man. I am going to give the devil and his dirty bunch police tonight that I am not asking for any quarter or giving any. Whenever you find the devil on one side of a question you will find him on the other side, individually, jointly and collectively. I lead for an old-time, heaven-born, God-sent revival, that will make the loose-tongued, lantern-jawed old gossip shut her mouth. You say that a revival is an abnormal condition in the church. I say that you are a liar. No I tell you what is the abnormal condition of the church: It is the theatre-attending, show-going, poodle-loving, bulldog-hugging, card-playing, whiskey-drinking, wine-guzzling, society-gadding, dancing-society set of mutts that we have in the church today. Sometimes I hear people talk of card-playing Christians, whiskey-drinking Christians and dancing Christians. It is just as impossible for that bunch to be Christians as it is for a wax-legged dog to catch an asbestos rabbit in hell. No sin, makes no difference how great your sins are, if you will repent you will be saved and if you do not repent, makes no difference how small your sins are you will go to hell. You do not go to hell because you sin but because you do not repent. There will be preaching tonight in the tent near the postoffice at 8:15.
