## Improving The Lawn

Mowing, Rolling and Sprinkling.
Washington, June 9.—There is no hard and fast rule to be followed in connection with mowing the lawn, but clipping twice a week is not apt to injure it, and will induce the formation of a good turf, according to the lawn specialists of the United States department of agriculture. The frequent clipping, however, is a drain on the vitality o fthe grass, and frequently results in permanent in-

jury.

There is some difference of opinion as to whether clippings should be re-moved after mowing, but in general their removal is advised, especially during wet weather, since if left to lie on the surface they are conducive to the growth of molds, which in turn produce injury to the turf. On new seedings, however, or where the grass is thin, clippings can frequently be allowed to remain with benefit.

Old sod should be rolled in the spring to firm the surface that has been loos ened by freezing and thawing, but during midseason it is very doubtful if the lawn should be rolled even lightly, especially where the soil is of a heavy nature.

The practice of sprinkling as it is almost universally followed is fundamentally wrong, not that the sprinkler does not furnish enough water to the grass during the season, but that it does not furnish it ir proposely distributed. it in properly distributed quantities. Sprinkling for a short period may appear to wet the sod thoroughly, but in reality the water does not pene-trate much below the surface. This encourages the formation of surface roots and makes the grass less resistant to the severe conditions weather and usage.

Except in rare cases, the lawn should not be watered oftened than two or three times a week, provided watering is done properly. A thorough soaking is necessary and should allowed to remain with benefit.

New seedings should not be clipped closely, and during the hot weather of midsummer and early fall the mower should be set high for old and new grass alike. #### Cooperate in Buying Purebred Live-stock.

Regardless of the duration of the war the resident farmer will make no mistake when he gradually substi-tutes livestock for cotton. He will in that way get out of competition with farm machinery, while our hogs and cows and colts will still further solve the hired labor problem by gathering their own crops in pactures nine months out of the year. In order to grow into the livestock industry, e must cooperate in the purchase of pure-bred sires and in the purchase of seeds. In this line of cooperative activity every local union in the cot-ton and tobacco sections should get Two or more members in each local union should purchase at least one pure-bred sire this spring. Investments of this kind will ultimately pay the biggest dividends that it is possible to obtain by any investment that can be made by a group of organized farmers in the cotton section.-J. Z. 
