New York, June 10.—Trading was quiet on cotton market today, but prices scored a net advance of 10 to 11 points in the morning dealings, after which there was sufficient realizing to cause some slight recessions, in the afternoon, however, the market was within a point or two of the best.

**MISS MARY ELIZABETH SMITH**

This elect lady was born in Dawson county, Ga., May 17, 1850, and sweetly felt asleep in Jesus March 31, 1915, in Belton, S. C. Her father, Wilbur F. Smith, a gallant Confederate soldier, a native of North Carolina, but a resident of Georgia, found a wife in South Carolina, Miss Susan Williams. She was a daughter of Capt. McCajal and Mrs. Matilda Tarrant Williams of Anderson county. It was from this family that Williamston, S. C., gets its name. This connection accounts for the removal of the family from Georgia to Carolina.

After attending Belton school, Miss Bessie entered Winthrop college, and graduated in 1900. She was class historian. For five years she gave herself to teaching in the public schools, but the call of a higher duty took her, in 1905, to Seagriff Bible and Training school, taking a two year's course, and graduating as president of her class. Later she was set apart as a deaconess by Bishop Hendrix, at Houston, Tex. In the fall of 1907 she went to Louisville, Ky., as head resident of the Wesley house, remaining three years. A nervous breakdown rendered a year's rest imperative. In January, 1912, she became assistant to Rev. Dr. Lee, pastor of St. John's church, St. Louis. This was her last engagement. Coming home in the spring of 1913 to rest and recuperate, she was never able to take up her special work again. But her spirit was unconquered and her zeal flamed out as before. She enrolled in 1914 as a correspondent student in the University of Chicago, though unable even to begin the work. This was to prepare her more fully for the work of a Bible teacher. She was also for the most of her last years on earth diligent and successful in all Christian work that she could find to do, making addresses, writing articles, and organizing a splendid Wesley class in our Sunday school in Belton. She worked continuously under the great Taskmaster's eye, and while hoping to be restored, yet no doubt under the spur of the brevity of her span of opportunity.

In 1912 Miss Smith published "In Bethany House," a story that was both a delightful piece of fiction, and a study in home mission work. It is indeed of distinct literary value, and deserves, and has had, a large sale. To us, her loved ones, her brother Claud in Brazil, to her pastor, her friends—to us all words fall to tell of the beauty of her mind and heart. Her life was comparatively short, but filled to the brim with strenuous endeavor, a victorious faith, and a gentleness of love that won her troops of friends. She slipped away that spring day, but she only went to a more lovely land than ours.
