WILLIAMSTON TO HAVE FARMERS CHAUTAUQUA

Extensive Preparations Under Way For Large Attendance July 28-30.

It is not going to be very long till the time for the farmers chautauqua will be here and you want to begin making preparations to attend. We want to be able to say at the close of this chautauqua that Williamston has held the largest and most valuable farmers meeting ever held in the United States.

We can, and we are going to, but you will have to help us make it so, for you are a part of this community and a part of South Carolina and this state can't do its best without your very best energies and soul being thrown heartily into it. We know you are going to begin work, in fact, we know you are already at work advertising by telling your neighbors and writing your friends about the Williamston Farmers Chautauqua. You are rounding up your work so you can return your farm loose for these three days and let give your time and life and soul to the chautauqua for the entire three days. It is not simply going to be a dry-farming affair. It is going to be filled to the brim with live things and you are going to be the liveliest thing there.

We are going to have some of the best speakers in the nation to address us, one of the best bands in the South will furnish the music and your two colleges, Clemson and Winthrop, are going to supply the real school work. You come and put in two hours each for the three days in the meetings conducted by those two institutions and you will have received a real short course in agriculture.

First Day.
The program for the first day has just about been completed. Gov. Richard I. Manning will deliver the opening address. Dr. D. B. Johnson, president Winthrop College will follow the governor with an address on the subject, "The Rural Home and the Farm Woman."

In the afternoon, the meeting will be divided into four or five divisions, under the direction of Clemson and Winthrop colleges. The men will be divided into two sections. Prof. Barton of Clemson will have charge of one meeting and will conduct a course of study on soil improvement. This will not be a dry-farm meeting, but a real live meeting in which you are going to be one of the chief factors.

Messrs. Calvin and Williams of Clemson will hold another meeting at the same place at the same time on the subject of live stock. They are going to have the stock there to use as text books, so you will be able to see just what you are going to learn as well as hear about it.

The women will assemble in the public school building where Miss Edith L. Farritt with the assistance of her four efficient helpers will conduct a practical demonstration meeting on the subjects as home canning, home gardening, home cooking, housekeeping, care of babies, how to feed babies, etc.

At the same hour other of Miss Parrotts' assistants will hold a meeting with the girls. This will be one of the best meetings of all, for Anderson county girls know how to make a meeting interesting and they are going to be the girls out of which this meeting will be composed.

Away off in the edge of the woods, Prof. Chas. R. Weeks, of Winthrop college will hold a meeting with the boys. He is going to the woods boys, so you may talk as loud as you please and disturb none of the other meetings. I think Prof. Weeks expects to have a few cows, horses, pigs, chickens, ropes, and sore toes to give added zest to the meeting.

After the class work is over the head will assemble the people in the main auditorium where we will listen to a lecture by Mr. O. B. Martin, of Washington. Mr. Martin will be no stranger to you, for he used to live near you and you made such a big man of him Washington came down and took him away, but they have agreed to lend him back to you for two days during the farmers chautauqua. You want to be sure and hear your old neighbor; that face of his is just as full of sunshine as ever and his speech is far fuller of food than in the past when he was among you.

At night there will be a meeting more along popular lines. It will be opened with a concert by the band which will be followed by some good speaker along on some popular subject.

Second and Third Days.
These days will be even better than the first day and we will announce the program for these days shortly. The afternoon work will be very similar to the afternoon of the first day. The reason for this is so you may come and attend the soil improvement meeting the first day and attend the live stock meeting the second day and the market selling meeting the third day.

Market Selling Meeting.
The South has learned how to produce fairly well but has learned very little about how to profitably sell our produce after it was made and there is when the consumer farmer has been coming at the "little end of the horn." Hon. C. E. Bassett, speaker.

alist in co-operative organization, from the bureau of markets at Washington will be present and deliver an address on the afternoon of the third day, but will likely be with us during the three days and conduct a school on profitable marketing each afternoon, where each farmer may go and learn in detail just what he wants to know about how to sell his crop.

Deep Pit Tons in Earth by Gas Eruption.
Quite a remarkable earth eruption occurred near Sinton, Texas, recently after gas had been struck at a depth of 2,200 feet, at a new well which was being sunk. When the stratum holding the gas was reached by the drill the casing that lined the bore was blown for a considerable distance in the air by the terrible force of the flow. For approximately three weeks the well remained unscathed and the gas shot out in great volumes. Then, without warning, a hole 75 feet in diameter and extending presumably to the bottom of the original well, was blown in the earth. Almost immediately this fissure was filled, with 100 feet of the surface, with boiling water. All the well-drilling machinery disappeared in the great pit.
