**How a City Man Made Good on a Farm.**

In the current issue of Farm and Fireside appears the following editorial showing how a city man made good on a farm:

"The city man has usually failed in backing to the land because he has had no competent guide.

"The county agent is now on the job in hundreds of counties, prepared to steer the tenderfoot from the rocks and briars, to assist him in selecting a farm, and to plan practical methods for him.

"For instance: Pete Frant, a railroad man who had never farmed, moved into Logan county, Oklahoma, last year. In order that he might be on intimate terms with the best adviser available he signed up with the county agent, J. A. Farquharson, who made his farm one of several demonstration farms. He harvested 2,300 bushels of corn from 50 acres, and got a good alfalfa meadow started.

"The period of confusion and perplexity and blues is over now, and Mr. Frant will be able to take the steering wheel himself.

"The county agent is the best buffer ever devised to stand between the back-to-the-lander and the Slough of Despond."

**How We Dump Valuable Soil Into the Sea.**

In the current issue of Farm and Fireside, the national farm paper published at Springfield, Ohio, a contributor writing under the title "Dumping Soil Into the Sea" tells how middle west farms lose eleven tons of earth a second. Following is an extract from what this writer reports:

"Eleven tons of soil is carried into the Gulf of Mexico every second by the Mississippi River from its immense drainage district. This material amounts to 346 million tons every year, and is equal to the surface soil, 6 2-3 inches deep, of 346,000 acres."

**INCOME TAX PAYERS TAKE NOTICE.**


