WHISKEY BUSINESS; ITS AWFUL EFFECTS

REV. M'LONDON ATTACKED IT LAST NIGHT IN EVERY SHAPE AND FORM.

BIG CROWD SUNDAY

Attendance on Sunday Night Estimated at 5,000 and Many Stood Outside in Rain.

Over 2,000 people were at the tent last night to hear the evangelist finish his sermon on "What sin is doing for the world," and his attack on whiskey was the strongest ever heard in Anderson. Mr. McLendon is suffering from a cold which was contracted on Friday night when he rode to the hospital in an automobile while being wet with perspiration, and his voice was not strong as usual last night but all of the congregation was able to hear him.

In taking up his sermon he began by a vigorous attack on "booze" and said:

"You say that people will get drunk anyway, you say people will murder their wives anyway, you say men will steal anyway. Here the evangelist turned to Rev. J. W. Speake and called him to his hands and see if he saw any blood on his hands and a reply in the negative being given the evangelist said:

"If you wait for me to vote for the damnable whiskey business you never will. What do you think of the man who tries to put the whiskey business on a community? Well, if you were to throw an emetic into hell and if it should vomit up all of its hidden wickedness, about the last arch angel spewed forth, would be better in my estimation than that bull-necked, buttermilk-faced, hog-jawed lobster.

Then the evangelist showed the difference between personal liberty and civil liberty. Then he took up the saloon as a thief, an infidel, a liar and an anarchist. In closing he showed how whiskey was instrumental in killing purity, virtue in womanhood, how it murders conscious and how the curse of God was upon it.

Yesterday Morning. Again yesterday morning as on Friday morning all of the stores and business houses in the city closed for the morning service and the tent was filled with mostly people who were able to attend because of the agreement entered into by the merchants and business men.

His subject at this service was on the first question asked man by God, "Where Art Thou?" and among other things the evangelist said:

"This is one reason why men absent themselves from the means of grace. They will give you many excuses, and hide behind many excuses, and tell lots of lies. We have the sick dodge, the kinfolks dodge, and the weather dodge, too hot or too cold, but in the great majority of cases, the reason why men and women, old and young, habitually absent themselves from God's house is because the house of God brings God near, makes them uncomfortable in sin. Adam was not successful in hiding from God, neither will you be. No man ever succeeded in hiding from God. God said to Adam, 'Where Art Thou,' and Adam had to come out from the bushes and meet God face to face and make full declaration of all his sins, and the time is coming, it makes no difference what kind of excuse you make, or excuses you hide behind, the time will come when you will have to come out and face God face to face, and make full declaration of just where you stand in His presence. People of Anderson, I believe God is putting this awful question to every man and woman, to every boy and girl, to every person, Christian and not Christian, 'Where art thou?'"

I want to ask you young men here today, where do you stand in regard to go, heaven, Christ and eternity. God is asking this question today to the business man, God's asking this question to the merchant and the clerk, the lawyer and doctor, the mechanic and farmer, to people in all walks and marts of life. 'Where art thou?'"

Three record breaking crowds heard Rev. Baxter F. McLendon, the evangelist, preach at the three services Sunday, once in the morning, once in the afternoon and at night. The congregations were by no means comprised of the people from the city and county of Anderson for there were some from all the neighboring counties and then from the upper part of Georgia. Sunday night the crowd was estimated to have been over 5,000, and although rain began falling long before the service, the people went on to the tent and stood or sat out side in order that they might hear the evangelist preach. It did not rain so very hard, but many of the people got rather wet and not a murmur of complaint was heard.

Sunday Morning's Service. Notwithstanding the fact that all of the churches in the city had services Sunday morning except St. John's Methodist, the tent was filled to overflowing. The evangelist took as his subject, "Sin," and although he preached a very strong sermon, he stated when he finished that the sermon would be finished in the afternoon. During the sermon a number of people were given of the word "sin" as follows: "Forsaking all, I follow Him."

his sermon on "Faith," he divided it up into five parts as follows: First, receptive faith; second, active faith; third, retentive faith; fourth, conquering faith and fifth, assurance of faith.

On these divisions the evangelist delivered the most illustrative sermon ever heard in this city and made it so plain that no one could not help but understand what was meant by faith.

Sunday Night. Sunday night owing to the fact that the evangelist was not feeling well, he did not preach long but began what is said to be one of his best sermons, the subject being, "What Sin is doing for the world." In dealing with this he did not get to the evil effects of whiskey but last night he took this up and showed the awful calamities which befall mankind because of the use of spiritual liquors.

In his sermon Sunday night he showed how sin separates man from God causes them to be untrue to God, how it darkened the intelligence of man, why it is the ruin and sorrow of earth and stated that sin had broken up every home on earth that had ever been broken up, that it dug every grave and that sin is death.

In closing the sermon he told of the second coming of Jesus and then gave an invitation to those who were not Christians to come and give him their hands and Jesus their hearts. The invitation was met with the heartiest responses of any since the beginning of the meeting and 252 marched to the front. For several minutes there was a steady stream of people walking down the aisles to the evangelist, many going from the outside where they had stood in the rain to hear the sermon.

One of the features on Sunday night was the attendance in a body of members of the Berean class of the First Baptist church. Seats were reserved for them near the front and during the services they were asked to sing one song by themselves.

Another feature of this same service was the singing of "Old Time Religion," and the waving of handkerchiefs when the chorus was reached. Mr. McLendon asked that every one in the congregation who wanted to help make the devil mad to get out their handkerchiefs and wave them when the chorus was sung. It seemed that half of the members of the large congregation did this and it was one of the most stirring things that has happened since the series of services began.

Great Enthusiasm. Mr. McLendon told a reporter for The Intelligencer yesterday afternoon that more enthusiasm was being shown in the meeting here than in any of the meetings he had ever attended and he stated that he had been to some of the biggest ever held. He stated that he was greatly impressed with the interest the people of all breeds were taking and said that it was better than that shown in any of the other meetings ever conducted by him.

When asked what the services would come to, a Sossie he stated that it might be next Sunday, or it might be the next and then it might run on for three more weeks.

There will be no more collections for incidental expenses unless the meeting goes on longer than this week since the amount has been raised.

Up until last night there had been a total of 1,857 conversations, there being 452 on Sunday.
