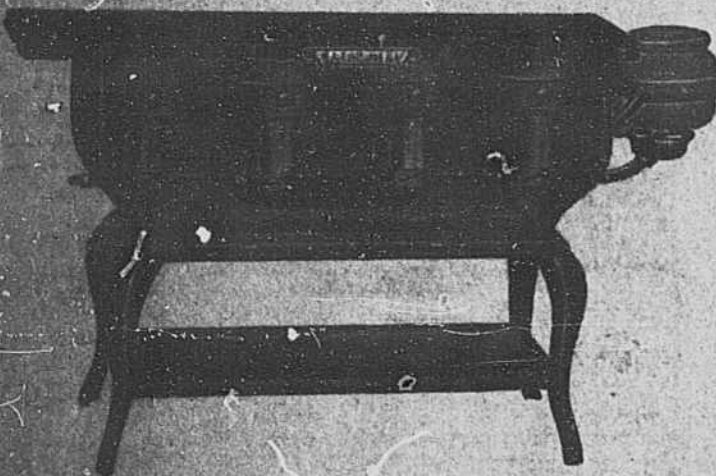

## BE THREE SERVICES AT THE TENT TODAY

EVANGELIST WILL PREACH IN MORNING, NOON AND AT NIGHT.

TO CLOSE TONIGHT

Mr. McLendon Will Leave Tomorrow for His Home in Bennettsville—Future Plans.

Although the interest in the McLendon revival seems right now to be greater than ever before, the evangelist stated yesterday afternoon that it would close tonight unless something unforeseen happened during the day. The tent will be taken down tomorrow and Evv. McLendon will leave for his home in Bennettsville sometime during the day.

Three sermons will be preached today. The subject of the sermon at 11:30 this morning will be "Rest;" in the afternoon it will be "Advice to Converts," and the subject for the night's sermon will be "And He Said Tomorrow." Mr. McLendon stated yesterday afternoon that the sermon tomorrow afternoon would be one of his best and that everybody ought to hear it.

After spending about a week at home the evangelist will go to Chicago, Ill., where he will purchase another tent, the one he has not being about worn out. He says that he will get a larger and better one next time.

From Chicago he will go to Sioux City, Iowa, where he will study evangelistic methods and where he will be with the man under whose preaching he was converted.

Mr. McLendon is going to take a rest of about five weeks, the longest that he has had since he was converted eight years ago last October. All during this time he has either been going to school or preaching and has been working as hard as any man could to make a success in his work.

After the evangelist returns from Iowa he will begin preaching again in South Carolina and stated yesterday that as he is far as he knows his work would be confined to this state for the next two years.

He also stated that some of the papers had stated that he would either go to Greenville or Spartanburg next but as yet has received no invitation from the preachers in the former city. He received an invitation early in the year from Greenville, but was unable to consider it at the time.

Yesterday the evangelist was flooded with requests to continue the meeting another week, many of them being telephone messages, some letters and nearly everyone he talked with asked him to preach a little longer. He stated that he was sorry that he could not do this but since his plans were made and he was so badly in need of rest, he thought, it best to have the revival come to a close tonight as was the intention in the beginning.

The contributions to the evangelist are coming in fairly well. Mr. McLendon came to Anderson without any agreement as to what the compensation for financial standpoint would be and all that he will get will be that which is given as a free will offering.

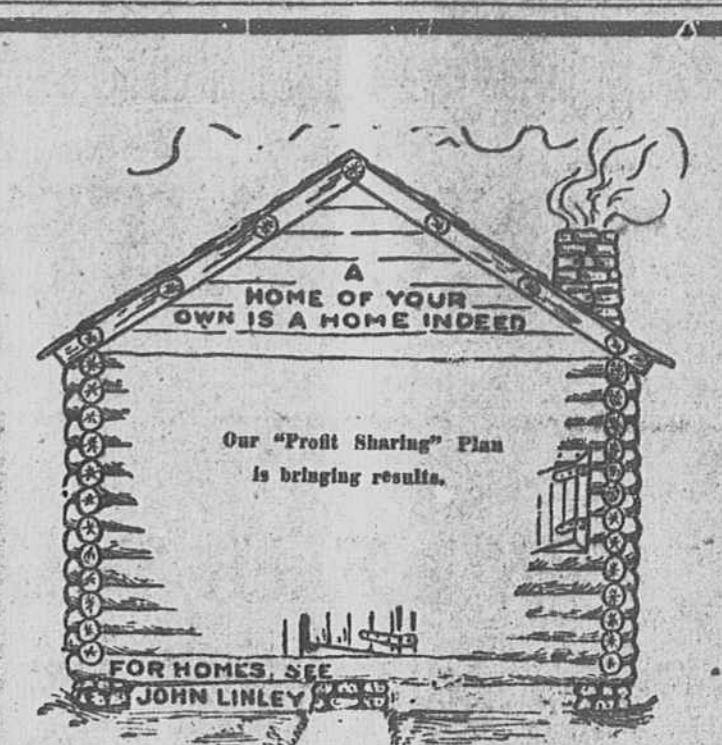
