SOUTH CAROLINIAN DIES IN COLORADO

Joseph A. Holmes, Director of Federal Bureau of Mines— Native of Laurens County.

Denver, July 13.—Joseph Austin Holmes, director of the federal bureau of mines at Washington, and widely known as a geologist, died here this morning of tuberculosis. Mr. Holmes was a native of South Carolina and 55 years old. A widow and four children survive him. Mr. Holmes is accredited with making "safety first" a national movement. He took for it a slogan of the bureau's work and it spread to all branches of industrial activity. Mr. Holmes was regarded as the father of the bureau of education and experiment largely reduced the death among the miners. Mr. Holmes always insisted upon going where his trained rescuers went, taking upon himself the duties of more robust men. This is believed seriously affected his health.

Sketch of His Life. Joseph Austin Holmes was born in Laurens county, November 23, 1859. He was the son of Z. L. and Catherine (Nichols) Holmes. He lived at Laurens for the first part of his life, being educated at the Laurens Academy and Holmes school in that town. After finishing these schools, however, he went to Cornell and graduated there in 1881.

On October 20, 1887 he married Miss Jeanie I. Sprunt, in Wilmington, N. C., who survives him. He continued his residence in North Carolina for several years, being professor of geology and natural history in the University of North Carolina, and then state geologist until 1904. In 1904 he was placed in charge of the United States testing laboratories in St. Louis for testing fuel and building material. He figured largely in the geological displays of the United States at the world's exposition. Since that time he has received many promotions and at the time of his death was director of the federal bureau of mines at Washington, which position he had held for several years.

He was a brother of N. J. Holmes, the well known evangelist.

There was no settlement. The men went back to the mines and asked for their places at the old wage scale. The miners have not asked recognition for their newly formed union.
