SPECIAL TRAIN WILL MAKE TRIP FOR ANDERSON COMPANY

GONE 10 DAYS

Full Attendance is Expected to Go on Encampment and Everything in Readiness.

Company B, Palmetto Rifles will leave on next Tuesday morning on a special train at 5:30 for the Isle of Palms where they will go into camp. The company will be gone ten days.

At Belton the Anderson boys will be joined by those from Pelzer and the First Regiment band of Williamston. The train on which they will travel is scheduled to arrive in Charleston about 3:30 in the afternoon.

Immediately upon reaching Charleston the company will go into camp near the pavilion.
