"Lusitania"

No single action of the European war has made so deep an impression on the American public as the destruction of the Cunard liner Lusitania, with a loss of over 1,200 passengers including many women and children. This disaster recalls vividly the sinking of the Titanic three years ago. It will be remembered that the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Company paid about \$100,000 to beneficiaries as a result of the Titanic disaster.
