MEDICAL SOCIETY MONTHLY MEETING

The monthly meeting of the Anderson county medical society was held yesterday at 12 o'clock at the hospital and the attendance was large. These meetings are held once every month and are always very beneficial to the physicians who attend. Dr. B. A. Henry of this city is president of the society.

Three papers were read yesterday, one by Dr. J. O. Wilhite, one by Dr. J. E. Watson and the other by Dr. J. C. Harris.

The subject of Dr. Wilhite's paper was "Summer Disease of Children," and proved very interesting as well as instructive. He brought before the attending doctors some facts about the disease and some things that he had learned in his practice.

Dr. J. E. Watson's paper was on the "Prevention of Summer Disease of Children," and was also very instructive. Dr. Watson has given much time and study to the treatment of children and his paper yesterday reflected much credit on himself.

Dr. J. C. Harris next read a paper on "Empyema of the Lungs." This was one of the most interesting papers that had been read before the society in some time.

WORK TO BE DONE ON OTHER STREETS HERE

CITY WILL USE ROAD SCRAPE AND FORCE OF HANDS

ARE IN BAND SHAPE

Heavy Rains of Few Weeks Ago Washed Them Rather Badly.

Mayor Godfrey stated yesterday afternoon that City Engineer Sanders had been instructed to stop the work on the streets which are to be permanently improved and have the other streets of the city worked. As it is known, a force of hands have been busy for the past several weeks putting down cement drains and curbing preparatory to the street paving and that owing to this work on the other streets had been somewhat neglected.

With the main streets of the city being torn up because of the permanent street improvements, and the other streets getting in a bad condition, many complaints were being made. Very little work has been done on the streets that are not to be paved since the heavy rains a few weeks ago, which washed them up considerably and some of them in some places are almost impassable, especially for automobiles.

The city will borrow one of the county's road scrapes and with a force of hands will within the next few days have the streets, which are not to be permanently improved in fine shape.
