### WILLIAMSTON OPENS FARMERS CHAUTAUQUA

WILL START THIS MORNING WITH BAND CONCERT

### HON. A. F. LEVER

Delivers Opening Address—Mr. C. E. Bassett Speaks Today Instead of Tomorrow.

The Williamston Farmer's chautauqua will open this morning at Williamston in the pavilion at the park at 10:30 sharp. The Pelzer band has been engaged for the entire three days and will open the chautauqua with a one-half hour open air concert, after which the program proper will begin.

Congressman A. F. Lever will deliver the opening address. Mr. Lever will discuss questions of vital importance to the welfare of the citizens of South Carolina. His lecture will not only be applicable to the farmers but to the people of all professions. His address will begin at 11 o'clock a. m.

Farm Lesson Study. At 2 o'clock p. m. the farm lesson study will begin. These meetings will not be set features but will be in nature of round table talks and farmers are requested to ask any questions about their troubles. These questions will be the basis of the speakers' discussions.

The soil improvement meetings will be under the direction of Mr. W. H. Barton of Clemson College, assisted by Messrs. Stewart, Chapman and Byars. A large stock meeting will be held at the same hour in another location, directed by Messrs. Galvin and Williams of Clemson College. A dairy meeting will be held during the same hour in another location under the direction of Prof. J. M. Burgess of Clemson College.

The women and girls will hold a meeting in the public school building near the park under the direction of Misses Garlington and Napier and Mrs. Williamson and Mrs. Walker of Winthrop College.

The boys will hold a meeting in the woods adjoining the park under the supervision of Prof. Whitfield of Clemson College.

C. E. Bassett Today. Hon. C. E. Bassett, specialist in cooperative organization, market bureau, agricultural department, Washington, D. C., will speak today instead of tomorrow as was scheduled. Mr. Bassett will begin his address at 4:30 o'clock and the subject will be, "The Propaganda of Farm Products."

At night there will be an open concert by the band and moving pictures with a short address by Mr. Bassett.

Col. E. J. Watson has a very elaborate exhibit of farm products on the grounds and it is one of the most complete ever shown in the state.

Mr. Furman Smith of Anderson has a very instructive seed exhibit which will be worth while for every farmer and his sons to see and study. Representatives of several farm implement manufacturing concerns will be on the grounds and will have machinery ready for demonstration. Admission to all of these meetings will be absolutely free.

### SHERIFF ASHLEY SAYS HE WILL BE IN RACE

WILL STAND FOR RE-ELECTION TO HIS PRESENT OFFICE

### FALSE STATEMENT

Being Circulated That He is Quitting Politics—Authorizes Intelligencer to Deny it.

Sheriff Ashley authorized a reporter of The Intelligencer yesterday morning to inform the people of Anderson county that he would be in the race for re-election to the office of sheriff and that he had no idea of not running.

"I want you to tell the people of Anderson county," Sheriff Ashley said, "that I will be in the race as sure as I am living. I've got no feathers on my legs and they have to beat me. I do not care who or how many enters, I will be right there. If there are any others who want to run for this office, tell them to come right on. I will welcome the man that beats me and will support him as much as possible in carrying out the duties of the office."

While the reporter was in the office a friend of Mr. Ashley's came in and while talking about things in general said that he had heard that the present sheriff would not stand for re-election and that he had heard it several times, some of the sheriff's friends being among those who had said this.

Sheriff Ashley told this man that his friends were mistaken for he had never had any idea of not running again next summer and that any such reports were false.

Already about 12 or 15 men in Anderson county have signified their intention of running for the office of sheriff in the next primary, but the general opinion is that some of these will drop out.

### Professor Has New Theory of Gravitation



Professor Thomas Jefferson Jackson See, who is in charge of the naval observatory at Mare Island, Cal., has announced to the Royal Society of London, a new theory of the cause of gravitation. The society to which Professor See submitted his theory was the same one to which Sir Isaac Newton made his first report after discovering the law of gravitation.

Professor See announced in St. Louis that next September, on the 250th anniversary of Newton's discoveries, he would make public many more details concerning his theory as to the cause of gravitation and other phenomena he has had under observation.

Professor See contends that gravitation is an electrical phenomenon which is caused by elementary electric currents circulating about atoms of matter. This theory is an extension and elaboration of physical laws first demonstrated by the French physicist, Ampere, ninety-five years ago.

Ampere showed that two parallel currents of electricity, flowing in the same direction, attract each other, but repel when flowing in opposite directions.

Much of the complicated electrical machinery of the present day is made possible by the adoption of this principle. Professor See goes beyond this hypothesis and asserts the entire universe is governed by forces dependent upon electricity in motion.
