FURTHER DETAILS IN REGARD TO DROWNING

BOTH YOUNG MEN WERE TRYING TO SAVE GIRLS

FUNERAL TODAY

Number People From Anderson Went to Abbeville Yesterday.

Further details reached the city yesterday morning in regard to the drowning of Calhoun Cason and William McKelvy at Millwood on Friday afternoon and they only add deeper sadness to the accident.

It seems that two young ladies, Misses Sara and Mary Ferrin, daughters of Mr. J. L. Ferrin, clerk of court of Abbeville county, were members of the camping party and had gone swimming in the river. After being in the water for some time, they got into water over their heads and began calling for help.

Messrs. Cason and McKelvy hearing their calls jumped into the river and attempted to get to them but were lost. It is stated that McKelvy could not swim very well but hearing the cries jumped in and tried to save the girls, who were a little later rescued by other members of the party.

McKelvy's body was recovered Friday afternoon soon after the drowning occurred but Cason's was not found until 6 o'clock yesterday morning, although the river was dragged all of Friday night.

Messrs. Will Lyon, W. P. Nicholson and Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Marshall went to Abbeville yesterday to attend Mr. Cason's funeral, which will be held this morning at 10 o'clock.

The time of the funeral of the other young man could not be learned. It is said that he is employed with the railway, his headquarters being in Charleston and that he was spending his vacation at Mt. Carmel. He was a young man about 30 years of age.

REVIEW OF FIRST YEAR OF EUROPEAN CONFLICT

assassination of the Austrian Archduke Francis Ferdinand in Sarajevo, Bosnia on June 28, 1914, while the immediate cause of the war, was not the determining influence. Europe had been on the edge of the precipice for a decade. Perhaps the chief underlying factor was the development of the national idea, demanding that political divisions should be made to correspond with the territory inhabited by the various peoples of Europe; that each people, with common language and customs, should have political independence and a "place in the sun." The struggle to attain this end kept Europe in political turmoil. France aspired for Alsace and Lorraine, Italy for Trieste and the Trentino, populated largely by Italians; Serbia for Bosnia, Rumania for Transylvania and Bessarabia. Austria-Hungary, within whose boundary Transylvania and Bessarabia, Austria-Hungary, within whose boundary is a complexity of races with varying claims and aspirations, was particularly menaced by the growth of this agitation—Serbia's desire for Bosnia—which brought on the crisis. The same motive brought a Montenegro and Italy, and influenced Russia and France to go to war.

The growth of the national idea was attended by the growth of militarism as a means for securing these desires. The greatest standing armie in history were built up, compulsory military service became widespread, and enormous navies were constructed.

Out of it all, with the mutual suspicion engendered, grew the situation which kept Europe in fear of war. Armed to excess, the nations awaited the war which finally came.

Rear Admiral Retired

Washington, July 30.—Rear Admiral C. B. T. Moore, commandant of the naval station at Honolulu since February, 1913, was transferred today to the retired list on account of age. Rear Admiral Clifford J. Boush is en route to relieve him. Capt. Albert Gleaves commandant of the New York navy yard since September, 1914, will succeed Rear Admiral Moore in the list of active rear admirals.

Austrian Spy Suicides.

Galveston, Texas, July 31.—A man giving his name as A. Goss and claiming to be a secret agent of the Austrian government, hanged himself with his suspenders in a cell here today. He had been arrested charged with swindling. Goss claimed he narrowly escaped arrest recently while working in Canada. A bank book indicated Goss had lived in Passaic, N. J.

German Losses \$2,500,000.

Copenhagen, July 31.—The latest German casualty list published brings the total of the published losses of Germany to 2,500,000 men. It is estimated that the number unpublished will bring the casualties up to 3,500,000 killed, wounded and prisoners.

Aeroplanes Have Collision.

Chartres, France, July 31.—An aeroplane making sharp volplane trial flights this morning collided with another at a distance of 200 feet up. Both fell and one aviator was burned to death, while the other was severely injured.

Pickens County Commissioners.

Columbia, July 31.—Governor Manning has appointed James M. Lawrence of Central and G. Wash Bowen of Easley, county commissioners for Pickens county.

Washington, July 31.—Fifteen cities getting daily weather reports through the movies. The forecasts will be furnished where they are desired. Birmingham was the first furnished.

Sidescars Carry Band in Night Cleo Parade.

One of the interesting features of an unusual motorcycle demonstration recently held at Milwaukee, Wis., was the way in which a 25-piece band was carried along the streets of the city during its participation in a night parade. Each member of the band was seated in a sidescar, the leader preceding the players and directing them by using a baton fitted at the tip with a small incandescent light which could be clearly seen by all the musicians following.

The problem of illuminating the music held on the instruments of the various players was solved in a simple manner, says the August Popular Mechanics Magazine, in an illustrated article. A small-globed electric lamp mounted in a reflector and connected with a storage battery carried under the seat, was provided in each sidescar. The lights were placed to the caps, or coats, worn by the members of the band, while the wires connecting with them extended over the men's shoulders, so that they were entirely out of the way.

STATE OF RUSSIAN FORCES IN WARSAW HANGS IN BALANCE

Petrograd, July 31.—Crossing the Vleprez near Travnik in an advance the Germans south of Bausk between the Piga and the Poinowch are causing more destruction than they did crossing the Vistula. At several points on the pontons an effort is made by the Germans to build bridges.

Operations against Kovno are interesting because it is regarded important as one of the strongholds of a prospective new Russian line. The Germans from the southwest report advanced positions in the report of Kovno and are also using northward. The Russians are fighting hard on the Narew and Bug. They claim notable successes in the Chmiel-Piaslki section inflicting heavy losses on the Teutons. They took one thousand Austrians prisoners in the Sokal region.

A German Air Raid.

Paris, July 31.—German aviators this morning bombarded Saint Pol-surmer and Gravelines killing a child at the latter place, according to the war office statements. No damage was done. Aviators have also thrown bombs on Nancy without much damage. One German machine was brought down between the Hines. The aviator escaped but the machine was brought down near the French line. There are also reports of the occupation of an evacuation camp by the explosion of a mine yesterday after spirited fighting.

Copper, Brass and Nickel Taken.

Berlin, July 31.—Military authorities in Brandenburg province in which Berlin is located issued an order expropriating all supplies of copper, brass and nickel. This includes household utensils which however, may be retained until further notice.

Aviators Report.

Geneva, July 31.—A Tribune dispatch from Innesbruck says the German aviators returning from a fight over Warsaw say they saw the Russian troops evacuating the city and marching east.

Property Indemnification.

London, July 31.—Grand Duke Nicholas, the Russian commander-in-chief, decreed that no property in Warsaw should be destroyed except for military necessity, says a Reuters Petrograd dispatch. Property owners will be indemnified.

New York, N. Y.—When Mrs. Lena Fraven went to buy some things from Marino Castragliani, a peddler, he asked her for a kiss. She refused and the Italian picked up a stick and struck her over the head, cracking her skull.

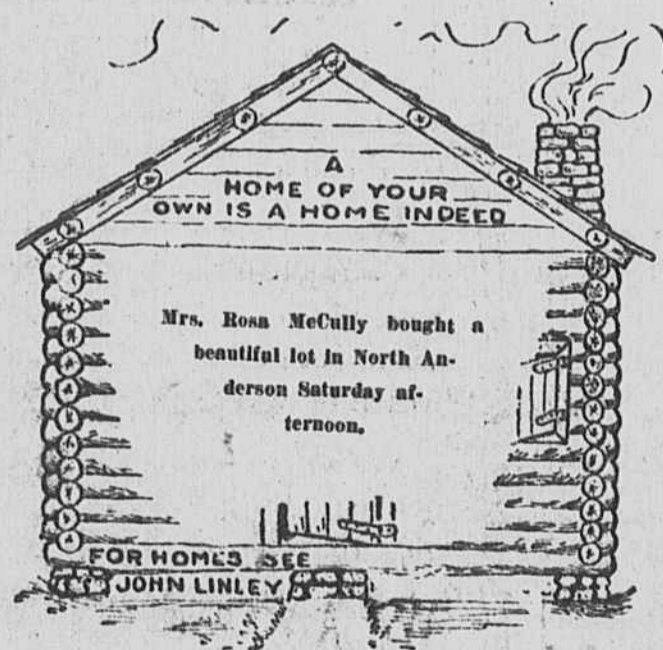
