The Farm Mortgage.

The credit of the railroads, their ability to earn a return of the omney invested in them, depends unpon the invested in them, depends upon the success of agriculture and yet, while railroad securities have, under normal conditions, fond a ready market on a four per cent basis, and the same is true of municipal and, to a great extent, of industrial securities, the farmer, who has furnished the real basis for the credit, and the prosperity of all, has been compelled to pay double the rate of interest for money with which to purchase and improcve his farm. The reason for this, or at least one great reason, is the fact that the vallroads, the municipalities, and the aveat industrial conmoted to overseer of apinning at the cipalities, and the great industrial concerus have at their command the ma-chinery or organization which en-ables them to offer the public a se-curity more readily negotiable or liquid than the farm mortgage.
