MISS CLARA M'GEE

SCUFFLE OVER AN AXE CAUSES LOSS OF ARM

Two Negroes Get in Fight and
Axe is Used Very Effectively—
Hand Completely Cut Off.

George McGee, a negro employed at the saw mill on the place of Mr. Joe Fretwell in the Fairplay section in the hospital having had his hand severed from his arm by an axe in the hands of Elias Regular, another negro employee.

It seems that the negroes there are each given an axe with which to cut down trees and prepare the logs for the saw mill, and that they are supposed to keep the axe and take care of it. It is stated that Regular had McGee's axe and when the latter tried to take it, a scuffle and fight followed in which the former's hand was cut squarely off.

Messrs. Jim and T. Balley, overseers, seeing the difficulty, ran up, and one of them grabbed the negro's arm to prevent further loss of blood. McGee, seeing a pistol in Mr. Balley's pocket grabbed it and was about to shoot the other negro when he was prevented from doing so.

The negroes have been in the employ of Mr. Fretwell for a number of years and are considered hard workers. McGee is said to be getting along nicely at the hospital and will be able to return home within a few days.

McGee-Hammond.

HOME-COMING DAY AT PELZER CELEBRATED

MANY FROM THIS CITY JOURNEYED THERE YESTERDAY

SPLENDID PROGRAM

Had Been Arranged, Consisting of Parades, Music Sham Battles and Basket Dinner.

Many former citizens of Pelzer journeyed back to the town of their birth yesterday, some of them for the first time since their departure, to help the home folks celebrate Homecoming Day. Many old friends met for the first time in years and the pipe of peace and happiness went the rounds.

An elaborate program had been prepared for the occasion. Festivities opened up with a grand parade consisting of old soldiers, a company of state militia, boy scouts and a band lustily playing popular and patriotic airs. After the parade the military company went to the ball park where they engaged in a realistic sham battle. The list of dead wounded has not been reported, due to the watchful eye of the censor, but it is understood that practically all of the dead arose and walked away.

A sumptuous basket dinner was served to the old veterans and this feature of the day was heartily enjoyed. Indications show that both home-folks and visitors thoroughly enjoyed the affair and many expressions of appreciation for the cordial reception extended by the Pelzer citizens were heard.

HORSE RAN AWAY ON SQUARE YESTERDAY

Boy Was Thrown From Buggy When it Was Overturned—No Serious Damage Done.

There was a runaway scrape on the square yesterday about 2 o'clock which for a time caused a great deal of excitement. A negro boy was thrown from a buggy, but not seriously hurt, and the vehicle was badly damaged.

The buggy belonged to Mr. Joe Fretwell and a negro boy about 12 years of age was in it driving the horse by himself. He was going down North Main street to the square, when the horse became frightened at one of the Interurban street cars. The buggy was overturned in some way near the Blue Ridge passenger station and the boy thrown out but not injured besides a few bruises. The horse kept on running and turned the corner into East Whitner street, when he brought the buggy in contact with Mr. J. H. Anderson's automobile, which broke the buggy loose from the horse. The animal kept going on down the street but was finally caught.

The buggy was a new one and strange to say it was not seriously damaged. Some parts of it were badly sprung but outside of that no great injury done. Quite a crowd gathered in the trail of wreck but when it was seen that no damage to amount to anything was done, it was quickly dispersed.

INSPECTION TRIP ON PIEDMONT & NORTHERN

Members of Railroad Commission and Others in City for Few Minutes Yesterday.

Messrs. Shealey and Hampton, members of the South Carolina railroad commission arrived in the city yesterday afternoon at 4:05 over the Piedmont and Northern on a special car. Saturday was spent in inspecting the road, the party leaving Chick Springs at 10 o'clock, arriving in Greenwood in time for luncheon and the trip then made on to Anderson.

The party consisted of Messrs. Shealey and Hampton, members of the commission, Mrs. Hampton, Mrs. J. T. Arnold of Chick Springs, P. C. Allford, traffic manager, C. W. Petrus, commercial agent and C. W. Crosby, trainmaster.

The party were met at the depot by Mayor Godfrey and others and after a few words they boarded the car and started on the return trip to Chick Springs at 4:15. The members of the commission stated that the system seemed to be perfect and that they had no complaint to make at all.

JNO. HUBERT HARDY IN A SERIOUS CONDITION

Was Run Over and Crushed by Automobile Tuesday Afternoon in Marietta, Ga.

A telephone message received in the city yesterday morning from Marietta, Ga., stated that Mr. John Hubert Hardy, son of Mr. S. G. Hardy of near Anderson, was not expected to recover from injuries received last Tuesday afternoon when he was run over and crushed by an automobile near that town.

Last Tuesday afternoon Mr. Hardy was playing ball in Marietta and while running across the road to get a batted ball he was run down by an automobile which was going at a rapid rate. He was knocked down and the wheels passed over him, crushing his body.

Mr. Hardy was rushed to a hospital immediately and given medical attention. Yesterday a member of the family here, was advised that no hope was entertained for his recovery. His father is at his bedside.

Mr. Hardy would be 24 years old on the 27th of this month. For the past four years he has been teaching school in Marietta and is well remembered in this city.
