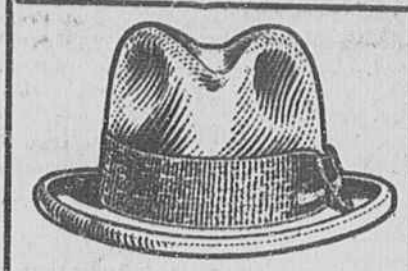
Robert E. Lee Chapter. The meeting of the Robert E. Lee chapter has been postponed from Friday afternoon of this week to Friday afternoon of next week.
