Dr. and Mrs. J. E. White are expected to arrive in the city this afternoon about five o'clock from Chick Springs and will be the guests of Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Ledbetter until they move into the parsonage. During the month of August Dr. White was in Philadelphia where he preached in several of the churches. Mrs. White has been at Chick Springs for the past few weeks. Coming with them will be their daughter, Miss Gladys White and little son, Mr. J. E. White, Jr., who has been in Anderson with Mr. and Mrs. Ledbetter since last Monday.

As announced several days ago next Sunday night special services will be conducted at the First Baptist church when pastors of the various churches of the city and representatives of the religious organizations will welcome Dr. White as pastor of the First church. Definite announcement in regard to who the speakers will be made in this paper later.

On Wednesday of next week a big Sunday school picnic will be given in the park at Williamston for Dr. and Mrs. White and family. All members of the Sunday school are invited. According to the plans made, special cars will run from Anderson and a low round trip rate will be secured.

This will be a kind of reception for the new pastor and his family by the members of the Sunday school.

On next Thursday evening at 8:30 o'clock there will be a reception at the First Baptist church for Dr. and Mrs. White. Sheriff Refuses to Appoint Mr. Carter

NO REASON WAS GIVEN YESTERDAY FOR HIS REFUSAL

WAS RECOMMENDED

By Brogon Mill Management for Appointment as Officer There—Law Regarding Matter.

Sheriff Ashley has refused to appoint Mr. F. M. Carter as officer of the law at the Brogon mills. No reason was given for his refusal.

Yesterday morning The Intelligencer carried a story to the effect that Mr. Carter had been recommended to the sheriff for appointment by the management of the Brogon mills and that he was highly recommended by three ex-mayors of Hartwell, Ga., where he was chief of police for 20 years. He was also recommended by Mayor Godfrey and Chief of Police Sammons.

Several days ago Mr. W. C. Gordon, the former officer at Brogon

mills, was removed by the sheriff upon a petition said to be signed by the majority of the residents over there. It appears that during the strike at the mill several weeks ago there was a little friction between Officer Gordon and some of the operatives and that they then decided to have him removed.

Sheriff Ashley was asked yesterday to make a statement regarding his refusal to appoint Mr. Carter and he said that he had nothing to say.

As yet the mill management have made no further selection for the place.

It is interesting to note the law in reference to the appointment of officers such as the one in question.

The mill management has the right to recommend a man for the place, the man to be appointed or commissioned by the sheriff. The latter may refuse to give the man, recommended by the mill management, a commission. The sheriff also has a right to remove at his pleasure any such officer without stating why such removal is made. The salary of the officer is paid by the mill and his duty is to keep order on the mill premises.

The people throughout the county will await the outcome of the Brogon mill affair with great interest.

THE FRASER ACADEMY OPENS SEPTEMBER 14

FIFTEEN ENROLLED

FIVE DISTRICTS HAVE THE COMPULSORY LAW

CHILDREN BETWEEN AGES 8 AND 14 COMPELLED TO ATTEND

LIABLE TO A FINE

Parents or Guardians Violating the Law Guilty of Misdemeanor and Fined Not Less \$2.

With the time of opening schools in various sections of the county drawing near, it is well to notice that at least four school districts in Anderson county will have compulsory school attendance and the white children between the ages of eight and fourteen will be compelled to go to school four months of the year.

The compulsory school attendance has been secured in the following districts: West Pelzer, Townville, Cleveland and Neal's Creek, all having had an election on the question.

The four districts which have taken advantage of the law are recognized as progressive, industrious communities. In view of the compulsory school attendance, the school facilities in each district have been improved.

The compulsory school term in the agricultural districts shall be four months, or the full term if the school runs less than four months, the term to be fixed by the board of trustees of such district, and any child or children not engaged in work at home in such agricultural districts, must attend a full term.

This law will not apply in any case in which the child's physical or mental condition renders his attendance impracticable or inexpedient; or in any case in which the child resides two and one-half miles or more by the nearest traveled route from the school house; or in any case in which, because of extreme poverty, the services of the child are necessary for his own support or the support of his parents, as attested by affidavit of the parents and of witnesses as the trustees of the school district may require. If a child is without necessary books and clothing and is unable to provide them, he will be exempted from attending school: Provided, that when books and clothes shall have been supplied by any means whatsoever, the child shall no longer be exempt from this provision.

Any parent, guardian, or other persons having charge or control of a child or children between the ages of eight and fourteen years violating the law by failing to cause such child to attend school, will be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$2 for the first offense, and not less than \$5 for any subsequent offense, nor more than \$25 in any case; or to be imprisoned not to exceed 30 days in the county jail.

It is reported that other school districts of Anderson county are to join the ranks of those compelling school attendance. If a majority of the qualified electors residing in the district sign the petition, compulsory school attendance can be secured only after an election.

Supt. Felton stated yesterday that in signing the petitions it will be necessary for the qualified elector of a school district to write opposite his name the precinct at which he voted last. The name of every voter in the school district, whether he signed or did not sign the petition is also necessary, in order the board of registration may declare the result.

1. The adoption of compulsory attendance in any district depends absolutely upon the co-operation of the people. This law simply means that all children between the ages of six and twenty-one years have the right to attend the local school of their district.

But in districts adopting the provisions of this act, children between the ages of eight and fourteen years will be required to attend four months in the country and the full term in town. Pupils under eight and above fourteen will not be affected. (Section 1.)

a. Upon petition of a majority of the qualified electors residing in the district.

b. Upon election after petition by one-fourth of the qualified electors residing in any district.

c. Upon election after petition by a majority of the board of trustees of any district containing an incorporated town of fifteen hundred inhabitants. (Section 9.)

Elections shall be held upon the order of the county board of education on the second Tuesday in June. Petition blanks may be had on application either from the state superintendent.

COLORED PUPILS

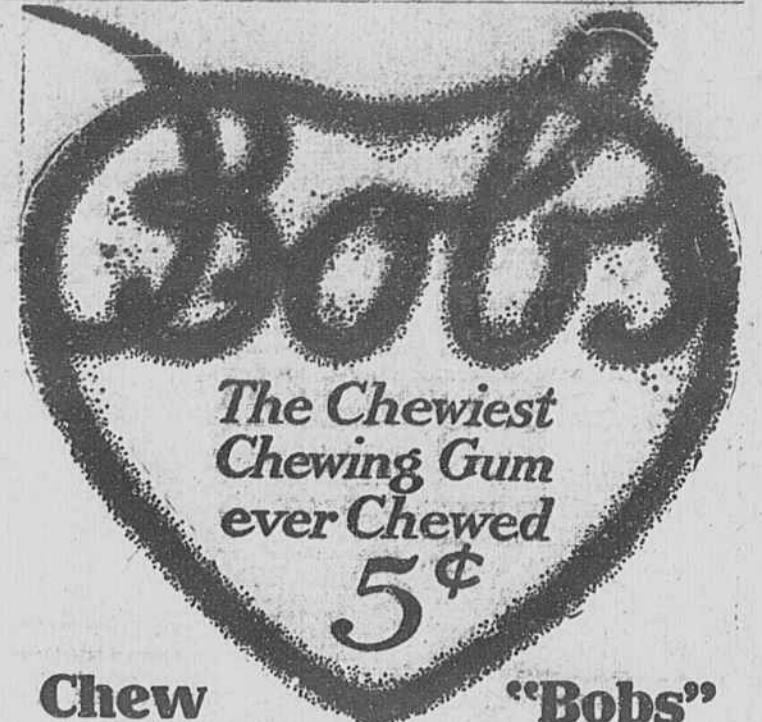
Will Be Enrolled at Schools on Opening Day and Need Not Come to His Office.

As announced, several days ago, yesterday was the first day for the enrollment of pupils to the city schools and during the day 250 enrolled. This is an unusually large number for the first day and points to a large attendance this season.

Supt. McCants' office was crowded all day with pupils who wanted to enroll. "I wish you to announce," stated Supt. B. C. McCants yesterday, "that I will be in my office every day this week from 9 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. and from 4 p. m. to 5 p. m. Those wishing to be enrolled will please call within these hours. Next week I will be here from 9 a. m. to 1 p. m., and from 2 p. m. to 5 p. m."

"Also state the arrangements have been made whereby the colored pupils will be enrolled at their schools on the opening day by the principal. You might also recall call attention to the fact that the pupils for the South Side, Glenn street and East Whitner need not come to my office for enrollment since the principals will be at these schools on Friday before the opening Monday for this purpose. It is rather far up here and this will save them the long walk."

It will be remembered that the city schools will begin their next session on Monday, September 13.

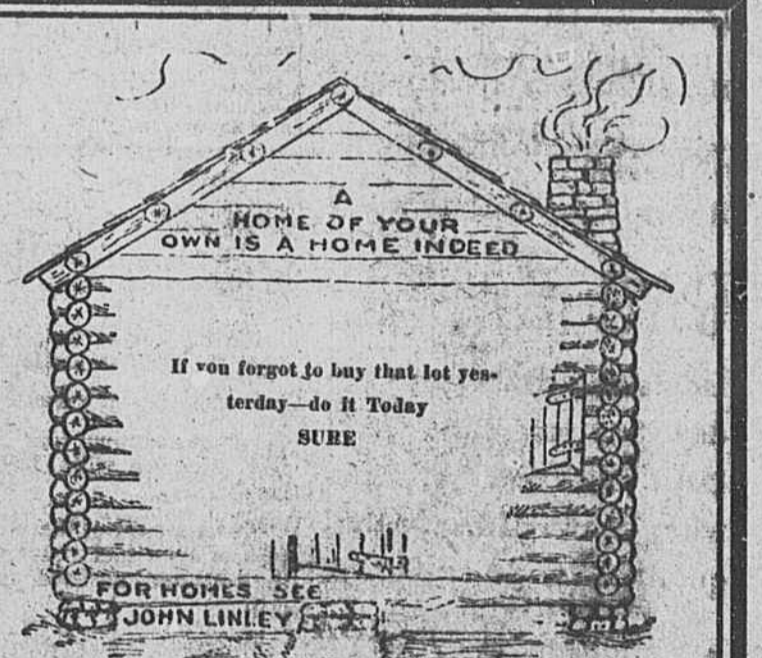
