

'S ARE GOING TO BUY CATTLE

ORDERERS FOR SOME LIKE 100 OR 150 BULLS

E LIVESTOCK

Keynote of Cattle Industry with Carolina Stated Mr. W. W. Long Yesterday.

Mr. W. W. Long, state agent farm demonstration work, was in the city yesterday conferring with Mr. S. M. Byars, farm demonstration agent Anderson county, and was asked about the livestock conditions in South Carolina.

"The livestock interest in the state is now claiming the attention of the farmers," stated Mr. Long, "and our experts are going to leave for the west in the next two weeks. We now have orders for between 100 and 150 bulls, if all parties purchase who have written us about the matter. We have received a great many orders from bankers and cotton seed dealers. There is also a great deal of interest being shown in breeding cattle for the market, which have been established at Greenwood, Columbia, Rock Hill, Florence and Charleston, these points having been chosen because of the railroad facilities.

"We are prepared to assist any number of farmers who want to feed from one up to carload of cattle for the market. The great advantage of these markets that have been established at the above mentioned points in South Carolina is that it will afford the small farmer to feed and sell on an equal basis to the northern markets. This is true from the fact that buyers from the north are going to attend these markets as they did at the sales we held at Rock Hill and Greenwood last fall. We are anxious to see a number of cattle fed in Anderson county.

"I do not want any man to understand that I am advocating that there is a fortune to be made in livestock but there is a place in our agriculture for this and our people will grow rather than go in to this business. I believe that considerable profit can be made when you take into consideration the value of the animal manure as fertilizer which will be obtained. I would be glad to see the farmers in Anderson county purchase a few purebred bulls both for beef and dairy purposes. Anderson county is sadly lacking in livestock, especially that of the high class order. We would like to see some orders for pure bred bulls coming from the farmers in this county.

"In this connection you might state that we do not allow our people to handle one dollar of the money. Those for whom we buy cattle have to select a man and send him along who handles all of the money. Our men have to pass on the value and the quality of the cattle and that is all.

The general opinion of all the jewelers from all sections of the country was that business is improving and this fall everything will be going fine.

Mr. Keese stated that one noticeable thing was that all of the hotels in New York were full and that there seemed to be more people buying goods than ever before.

"You can tell the people," stated Mr. Keese "that cameos are going to be more popular this year than ever before and that cameo rings have the day. The bracelet watch is also the fad but up there in New York all the girls are wearing them on their ankles instead of their wrists. A new article, that made a great hit was a new ad-a-link ring and they are very pretty and will take well."

Mr. Keese stated that he bought the largest stock of jewelry and things in other lines carried by jewelers that was ever shipped into South Carolina.

Odd Popular Beliefs.

(From the Pathfinder.) The inhabitants of Brittany are very simple and credulous and they love to make out buildings, etc., to be much more ancient than they really are. For example they ascribe the Morlaix viaduct to the Romans, whereas it is a comparatively modern work.

However, there is some foundation for the tradition that it was built by the Romans, for those wonderful colonnades visited this place and left many evidences of their operations. Their name for it was Mons Rolarius, and in the course of time this name was altered into the modern Morlaix.

The town was attacked at various times by the English, during the wars they had with the French and there is still a "fountain of the English" there, which is said to have been drenched with British blood at the time of a battle in 1522. It was at Morlaix that Mary Queen of Scots was married in 1558, to Francis II of France.

Around Morlaix there are many peculiar superstitions that are prevalent among the common people. For example ample they think that is a person meets with a violent death his spirit will hover over the place until such a time as he would have died if he had lived to die a natural death.

This is a typically Irish conception—and here again you can note the close cousinship of the Celts of Brittany with those of Ireland. In earlier times many Christian missionaries and colonizers came over from Ireland to settle in Brittany. A peculiar rock on the Breton coast is still known as "the Monk's Leap," from the tradition that St. Vland, coming from Ireland centuries ago, landed at this place.
