CITY TO BUILD LARGE BARN IN NEAR FUTURE

ACTION WAS TAKEN AT CITY COUNCIL MEETING YESTERDAY

WILL RECEIVE BIDS

Committee to Report on Matter When Special Meeting is Held.

Yesterday afternoon at the regular meeting of city council a committee consisting of Messrs. Dobbins, Carter and Tate were requested to receive bids for the erection of a barn in which will be kept the city's mules, wagons, implements, etc., the same to be built on the quarry lot on West Market street.

Yesterday morning The Intelligencer carried a story about bids being received for the keep of the mules and stock from several livery stable men in the city. At the meeting of city council yesterday afternoon it was decided to build the barn instead.

The city has about eighteen mules and the bath will be built large enough to take care of these and will have sheds for wagons and the tools. Bids will be submitted within the next few days and work will start soon after the committee reports to city council, which will hold a special meeting in the near future to attend to matters that are to come up.

COUNCIL RECOMMENDS RE-ELECTION MAJOR

AS CITY FOOD, MEAT AND MILK INSPECTOR NEXT YEAR

OTHER MATTERS

Were Disposed of By Body—Will Get Man to See After Cleaning Streets of the City.

At the regular monthly meeting of city council yesterday afternoon a motion passed that recommendation be offered the city board of health that Dr. John Major, meat, milk and food inspector, be re-elected to serve for the ensuing year. Dr. Major's work during the past year has been very satisfactory and the board of health and city council appear to be well pleased with his services.

Other Matters.
At the meeting of city council several other matters of minor importance were taken up and disposed of as follows:

The city engineer was requested to see Mr. Thompson, the shoe man, about the large sign which has been placed in front of his store on the east side of the square. It seems that the large shoe sign was not put up according to instructions and that there has been some complaint about it.

Mrs. J. Rezac Fant offered the necessary space of land for a cement sidewalk from White street to the city cemetery property provided the city would have a paved sidewalk put down. The proposition was accepted and the work will be taken up in regular order.

On request from Dr. James P. Kinard regarding the condition of the streets near Anderson college the mayor stated that they would be weeded and put in better shape before the opening of the 1915-16 session.

The hydrant committee recommended that hydrants be established as follows: Two on Hampton street and Cleveland avenue and one each on Manning and Elizabeth streets, the location to be decided later.

Alderman Carter asked that a light be put on Tribble street near the Underpath residence; Alderman Tate for one on corner of Sanders and Tribble streets. These questions were referred to the light committee.

The recommendation from the board of health to the effect that someone be engaged to attend to the matter of the cleaning of the streets of the city, the duty which now falls on Health Officer Campbell, was discussed favorably. Action regarding this will be taken later.

FALL TERM OF COURT CONVENED YESTERDAY

JUDGE ERNEST MOORE OF LANCASTER IS PRESIDING

FIRST DAY BUSY ONE

Many Pleas of Guilty Were Entered—Bowden Case Not Finished.

The fall term of the court of general sessions convened yesterday morning at 9:30 o'clock with Judge Ernest Moore of Lancaster presiding. The first business was that of calling the roll of the grand jurors and all were present. The clerk then read the commission of the presiding judge.

As usual on the first day a great number of witnesses were absent but there were enough present for the solicitor to present a number of indictments to the grand jury. When presenting the bills Judge Moore charged the grand jury in regard to each one. He directed them to take up the indictments of murder first. In each instance he gave a short synopsis of what each bill should be worth in submitting their returns to the court.

During the day several prisoners who have been in jail entered pleas of guilty and the first real jury case where argument and witnesses was presented was taken up yesterday afternoon. This case was the state against J. H. Bowden, indicted for malicious injury to trees. When court adjourned yesterday afternoon this case had not been finished. The penalty in a case of this kind is a fine of not over \$100 provided the damage done does not exceed \$20; if over this amount defendant is to be fined according to damage done.

Those Pleading Guilty.
Marion Webb, indicted for assault and battery of a high and aggravated nature, plead guilty. He was sentenced to two months or a fine of \$25.

Nathan Cureton, indicted for violation of the dispensary law, plead guilty, stating that this was his first offense. He received a fine of \$100 or a sentence of three months in jail.

Katie Crump, the negro who was placed in jail a few days ago on the charge of arson, she having confessed to setting fire to a cabin occupied by negroes in North Anderson, entered a plea of guilty. In a case like arson a plea of guilty can not be entertained and a jury was empaneled. The defendant then took the stand and told the judge and jury about the matter. She was sentenced to ten years in prison.

J. Hugh Baldwin, the negro boy about 18 years of age who was arrested on Sunday on the charge of house-breaking and larceny, entered a plea of guilty and was sentenced to eighteen months. The boy recently was dismissed from the reformatory.

George Norman plead guilty to larceny of livestock and was sentenced to three years.

Leo Brady, a young white man, entered a plea of guilty to stealing a bicycle. An appeal for a light sentence was made in this case it being shown that Brady came here with his mother and two young children from Georgia to work in the Anderson cotton mill. A strike was on at the time and he was unable to get work. He used all his money in paying his mother's and two children's railroad fare back home. He was then out of money and after trying in vain to get employment he stole the bicycle in order that he might ride it home. The case was considered favorably by the judge and the man was sentenced to one year, the minimum.

Murder Cases.
The case of Walter and Will LaBoone, charged with murder, has been set for trial Thursday.

The case of Frank H. Hudgens, charged with murder, is set for Friday. Another murder case set for the same day is that of the state against Lawrence Earle.

SHOOTING AFFAIR LAST SUNDAY NIGHT

OCCURRED NEAR BARNES STATION IN ABBEVILLE COUNTY

NEGRO ARRESTED

By Sheriff Ashley While He Was Trying to Locate Still Near Gregg Shoals Sunday.

Sheriff Burts of Abbeville has been notified by Sheriff Howard to send after Walter Latimore, a negro, who it is charged shot and seriously wounded another negro, Dock Eldridge, just over the Anderson county line near Barnes station Sunday night.

Sheriff Ashley was near Gregg Shoals trying to locate a still and hearing of the shooting began to investigate. Latimore was later discovered about three miles from the scene and was placed under arrest. Sheriff Ashley at the time thought that the shooting had occurred in Anderson county.

It is stated that this is the second time that Latimore has shot Eldridge, both times the bullet going through the upper part of his chest. The trouble seems to be over a woman and from what can be gathered Latimore is in the wrong.

Sunday night the shooting occurred in Eldridge's house, which is located near Barnes station in the lower section of the county. Eldridge, although seriously wounded, is expected to recover.

REPEALS ORDINANCE AFFECTING GASOLINE

FILLING STATIONS MAY NOW BE PLACED IN HEART OF TOWN

ONE ON MAIN ST.

Is Almost Certain Since Petroleum Oil Company Will Very Likely Install One.

That part of an ordinance of city council which prohibited the establishment of gasoline stations on Main street or around the square between Earle and Market streets was repealed yesterday afternoon. As it is now these gasoline stations, if properly built and constructed and approved by the city engineer, may be established in any part of the above named district.

This action was taken after a letter had been read from Mr. Chas. A. Gambrell of the Petroleum Oil company in which it was stated that he wished to have one erected on Main street in front of the store room which is now being built near the Blue Ridge railway cut by Mr. J. H. Anderson. Mr. Gambrell is contemplating renting this room.

At the meeting it was pointed out that the gasoline stations were allowed in other cities in the heart of the business districts and that they were now getting to be a necessity. Since the ordinance has been repealed, no doubt, many stations will be placed in the heretofore restricted district.

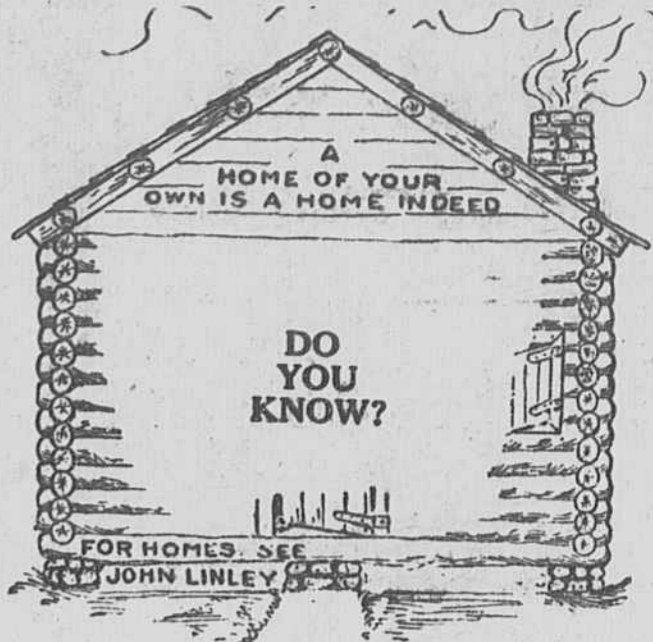
