Anderson College To Open Tomorrow

FIRST FACULTY MEETING OF YEAR WAS HELD YESTERDAY

TO MEET STUDENTS

Special Committees Will Meet all In-Coming Trains Today— Exercises Thursday.

The first Anderson College faculty meeting this year was held yesterday at noon and the work for the 1915-16 session, which opens tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock, was outlined. All of the teachers have arrived and were present at the meeting yesterday.

Today special committees will meet all incoming trains and will escort the students to the college. The number of students expected this year shows an increase of about 25 per cent over that of last year and many of these are out of town young ladies. Dr. Kinard stated yesterday that he would be glad if friends of the college who have automobiles would assist today in taking the students out to the buildings.

Dr. Kinard states that all except 12 rooms in the dormitory will be in use this year which is very gratifying. Besides the boarding students there will be a number from the city of Anderson and points along the interurban railway.

College Opening. The 1915-16 session begins tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock with special exercises. Dr. John E. White, pastor of the First Baptist church of this city and Dr. Z. T. Cody of Greenville, president of the State Baptist association will be present and take part in the exercises. On Friday morning all students will enroll in their respective classes. On Saturday morning the students will attend classes and lessons will be signed.
