NEWS NOTES FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

Bryan to Lecture Before University Students—Much Interest in Coming State Fair.

Columbia, Sept. 26.—"The State of South Carolina is facing an era of unprecedented prosperity," said a public official today discussing the condition of the state. He pointed out that the farmers this year have produced the greatest food crop in many years.

William Jennings Bryan, who delivered an address in Columbia several nights ago, is to make two more trips to the state before the end of the year.

L. L. Baker, state agent for the boys' club work of the United States department of agriculture in South Carolina, has been in Columbia for several days to make arrangements with the state fair society for a big exhibit at the fair this fall.

William Blackman, commissioner of conciliation of the department of labor, Washington, has arrived in Columbia from Kansas City, and will give expert advice to Gov. Manning in the matter of framing just inspection rules for the Columbia street railway system.

There is much interest in Columbia in the Clemson-Carolina football game which will be played Thursday of fair week. Carolina is said to have unusually fine material.

Five negroes will be electrocuted at the state penitentiary next Wednesday morning between 11 and 12 o'clock. They are the four negroes convicted in Chester on the charge of murder and Joe Malloy, a negro from Marlboro county, who must pay the death penalty for the death of two little white boys.

While no official announcement has been made it is very probable that Gov. Manning will ask the next legislature to pass a measure providing for a state board of arbitration.
