Col. Stribling is bubbling over with enthusiasm. He says that all of the committeemen are working over time, and that everything is shaping up nicely for the great celebration. "It nicely for the great celebration. "It is going to be one grand success, and the biggest thing we have ever held up in this part of the country," declared the colonel.

"Do you know, and what I am going to say is an historic fact," that in November, 1858, the Pendleton Farmers' society appointed a committee to seven to investigate the feasability of founding an agricultural college," asked Col. Stribling. "Well, Maj. Sloan was a member of that committee and today is the culy surviving member. The work of grant committee was the planting of the germ which later developed into Clemson college."

Col. Stribling says he and every official of the society feel honored because of Maj. Sloan's desire to be enrolled as an honorary member of the society. During his visit in Pendleton Maj. Sloan will be the guest of Col. Stribling.
