NEVER HAPPY UNLESS IS SERVING SENTENCE

ESCAPED FROM CITY JAIL THURSDAY NIGHT, USING SAW

IS OLD AT GAME

Haskell Davis, Young Negro, Released From County Gang, Gets in More Trouble.

Haskell Davis, a negro boy about 17 years old, made his escape from the city jail Thursday by sawing one of the bars in the window of his cell in two. He was put in the cell Thursday afternoon and when the keeper went to give him his breakfast yesterday morning, he had frown the coop. A hack saw was used in sawing the three-quarters inch bar in two, a piece of the saw being found in the cell yesterday morning.

Only a few days ago Davis was turned loose from Capt. McConnell's squad of the county convicts. He was serving a sentence of 30 days for stealing a pair of shoes.

However, this was not the first time that Davis had been on the county gang. Once before he served a term of a few months and after finishing his sentence he stepped right back into his old ways. Just a few days after he was released, he stole a pair of shoes but ran off to Greenville before he could be arrested. Arriving in Greenville he could not resist the desire of obtaining some pretty articles of clothing which he had seen, and as the result he got a sentence of six months in that county.

After serving his sentence he was brought back to Anderson and given 30 days for stealing the shoes. Now he is in mischief again and will probably be apprehended within a few days. He had been placed in jail for stealing paint brushes from Mr. W. L. Brissey.

Capt. McConnell said yesterday that Davis was one of the best working men he had ever had and that he was released that it would only be a short time before he would have him back again.
