THE COTTON GINNED IN SOUTH CAROLINA

CENSUS REPORT SHOWS DECREASE OVER LAST YEAR

COUNTY REPORTS

Shows Number of Bales Ginned to Date This Year and Same Time 1914.

That there has been less cotton ginned in South Carolina this year than last is evinced by the report of Mr. Samuel L. Rogers, director of the census, department of commerce. The report was made public for the state Monday, Oct. 4.

OLD CAPITAL OF SERBIA TAKEN BY INVADERS

to stand with assurances of continued neutrality. Thirty-two thousand allied troops are reported as already landed at Saloniki, the obstacles to their transportation to Serbia being removed by the prompt action of the Greek minister's communications in the Venizelos cabinet, freeing the railways from Austro-German control. Russia made an official announcement of the sinking of a German transport by a British submarine in the Baltic.

The Dvinsk battle front still claims the greatest attention is centered on the fighting in the eastern zone. The Germans are now launching an attempt to take the city from the north.

The onslaught exceeds in violence the previous attacks from the west and south. The Russians admit the loss of part of their trenches, ten miles north of Dvinsk. On the rest of the eastern front, just who is on the offensive is in doubt. There is German artillery fire on the whole western front. It is particularly violent against Loos, and the left wing of the allies in Champagne.

Bulgars Object.

London, Oct. 9.—A dispatch to the Central News, forwarded from Sofia says Premier Radoslavoff informed the Greek minister that the landing of allied troops at Saloniki was in harmony with the avowed attitude of the Greek government toward Bulgaria. The premier added that the Bulgarian cabinet could not be responsible for a change of feeling on the part of the Bulgarian people. The Bulgarian minister at Athens said he had been instructed to make similar representations.

French Report.

Paris, Oct. 9.—Reports of the night indicate that the German losses in the offensive yesterday against the positions of the allies, near Loos were very heavy, the French war office says.

Rome, Oct. 9.—The British minister Elliot plainly told King Constantine of Greece during an audience Thursday that Great Britain and France were determined to push through the military expedition now being landed at Saloniki. An Athens correspondent of the Giornale d'Italia says the views of the quadruple entente were explained to the Greek ruler in very energetic terms by the British diplomat.

Hint to Others.

COBB CHAMPION BATTER AGAIN

Chicago, Oct. 9.—For the eighth time in his career, Ty Cobb is the champion batter of the American league, according to averages published here. He has led the league every season since 1907, except 1908. Cobb's average this year is .369. He set a new league record of stolen bases with 97; scored 144 runs; 271 total bases.

Other American batters: E. Collins Chicago, .333; Fournier, Chicago, .325; Speaker, Boston .313; McInnis, Philadelphia, .314; Wood, S. ore, Ruth, Foster, all of Boston, led the pitchers.

National League.

Larry Doyle, New York is National champion with 314; Cravath, Philadelphia, led in runs scored 88; total bases 26, homers 24. Herzog stole 34 bases. Other batters: Lugerus, Philadelphia .313; Griffin, Cincinnati .307; Daubert, Brooklyn, .304; Toney, Cincinnati, Alexander, Philadelphia, Maax, Pittsburgh, lead the pitchers.
