BOARD OF DIRECTORS CHAMBER COMMERCE

HELD MEETING YESTERDAY AFTERNOON TO DISCUSS PLANS

MAKE CANVASS

We Decided to Call On All Delinquent Subscribers Personally to Collect Money.

The board of directors of the chamber of commerce met in the rooms of the chamber yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock for the purpose of discussing the future course of this organization. After full discussion it was the sense of the board that the city of Anderson could in no way afford to be without a chamber of commerce.

It was shown that Greenville, Spartanburg, Columbia, and in fact all the live cities of the state have an active chamber of commerce which is of vast importance to each of these communities. The members explained that Anderson cannot afford to be without a chamber of commerce but what the future of the present organization rests solely with the citizenship of this community. There are members who have not met their obligations to the chamber of commerce and consequently the organization is in debt.

It is the purpose of the members of the board of directors to make a personal canvass within the next few days with a view to collecting the funds needed to liquidate the indebtedness, and also with the earnest hope that the chamber may be continued as an agency for good for the entire community.

It was pointed out that with Greenville, Spartanburg and all of the neighboring cities having their live and active board of trades, Anderson would be left far behind unless she has an organization whose principal business is to look out for the interest of the city.

The board is aware that mistakes have been made in the past and its members are perhaps most cognizant of the fact than anyone, but it is now time for all of these to be forgotten. The people are now asked to hold up the hands of the board of directors and again place the chamber of commerce in a position to be more active and useful than it has ever been.

The people of the city are urged to join with the board of directors in this cause and pay up their old subscriptions and make new obligations to this cause which means so much to the community.

BELTON MAN INJURED

J. A. Scott Struck by Interurban Car and Seriously Injured.

Mr. J. A. Scott of the Belton mill was struck yesterday in the city limits of Belton by a Piedmont & Northern car about 12 o'clock and received serious injuries. Mr. Scott was knocked down, a deep gash cut in his head and another in one of his lower limbs. Advice from Belton last night stated that the injured man was getting along very well.

It appears that Mr. Scott is partly deaf and blind and was walking up the tracks. It is supposed that he did not hear or see the car approaching and that the motorman expected him to get off the tracks. Mr. Scott is 44 years of age and is a widower.

DELEGATION MEETS ON TUESDAY MORNING

SENATOR SHERARD YESTERDAY CALLED THE MEETING

TWO MATTERS

To Be Discussed—Changes County Jail and Home and Appointment of Magistrate.

Senator J. L. Sherard yesterday announced that he had called a meeting of the Anderson county delegation to the general assembly to be held in his office next Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock.

This meeting is held primarily to consider recommendations made by the secretary of the state board of charities and correction relative to certain changes being made in the county jail and in the county home. Mr. Johnstone recently made a visit to Anderson and after visiting the county jail and the county home made certain recommendations and improvements which have been announced before.

Another matter that will be considered will be that of recommending to the governor a man for the appointment of magistrate in Brushy Creek township, this place having been made vacant by the death of the magistrate. Mr. Sherard stated yesterday that he had received only one application for the position and that was from Mr. H. A. Foster, who had been highly recommended.

Mr. Sherard announced that a general meeting of the delegation would be held the first part of next year in the county court house at which time the people would be invited to appear and make suggestions in regard to certain legislation that they wished urged at the next session of the general assembly.

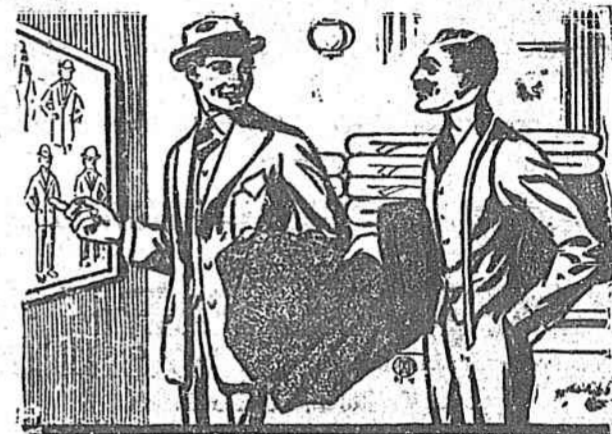
