**GAME PRESERVE IN ANDERSON COUNTY**

RESIDENTS OF PENDLETON SECTION AFTER PROTECTION

**WITHDRAW PERMITS**

In Future All Persons Hunting on These Lands Will Be Prosecuted.

Realizing that the property near them is protected and desirous of the same protection, residents of Pendleton section have published statement that permits granted to hunt, fish, camp, etc., on their land are now regarded as null and void and that trespassers will be prosecuted.

Mr. V. S. Sloan, of Pendleton has prepared the following statement for publication, having already secured the names of many residents near the county lines for a petition. Mr. Sloan's statement reads as follows:

"Mr. Henry Trescott of Pendleton has been appointed game warden in Anderson county, by the governor, and he is duly empowered to arrest and prosecute all offenders against the hunting and fishing laws. Mr. Trescott and officers of the law are authorized to call for show of the above permits when they find parties hunting on these lands.

Section 730 of the code of 1912, makes it a misdemeanor to hunt, or fish, or to range across a man's land for such purposes, without first having the consent of the owner, or manager of the property. Each and every offense is punishable by a fine up to twenty dollars or up to thirty days in hard labor.

The resident hunters license act of 1915 requires that a man to hunt in the license county in which he resides must have a license known as a resident county license, this to cost \$1.00. Landlords and tenants on their freeholds and leases, is excepted. (It is ruled that a tenant for agricultural purposes has no hunting rights—and a man that leases a piece of property for the hunting rights, is not a tenant under the eyes of the law.) A landlord resident of the county in which his lands lie may give any other resident of the same county a written permit to hunt on his lands, which written permit serves in place of a license there—but it must be carried while hunting and exhibited on demand of any game warden or officer.

A person hunting in any licensed county where he is neither resident nor landowner must have a state resident hunters license—cost \$3.10. This allows him to hunt in any and every county without any other license.

Hunters must bear in mind a hunting license cannot give the right to trespass on private property. It only squares him with the state to hunt in accordance with the laws of the state. He should at all times have the consent of the property owner or be liable to prosecution for trespassing according to section 739.

Any non-resident of the state, whether he owns and pays taxes on one or one million acres of land in this state must have a non-resident license, costing \$15.25. The penalty for violation of this act is from \$100 to \$500 or from three to 12 months at hard labor.

At the next session of the legislature it is earnestly desired by many property owners, that Anderson will come into the fold of the protected counties. The law is working fine in those counties, in which it is in force and its good effects are easily seen. In Charleston and Dorchester, already "colored gentlemen" are doing things on the public works for the little oversight of not procuring licenses before hunting.

The prowling thomas cat, and the rabbit hunter—the man who, has nothing but a dog and a three dollar once time gun, are the main causes of the disappearance of the game.

The rabbit hunter hunts only on boggy and stoniest of days and walks like a cow into the newly planted oats and wheat fields. He finds the quail on the chilly rainy days, huddled under some low bush and he "grounds 'em," wiping out the whole covey. His friend takes along the bag to bring in the rabbits and into that bag often goes the Farmers prospective Thanksgiving turkey—or the fat hen, or the guinea, or perhaps a bushel of the yet unharvested corn. Bunches of hunters get together in sketched lives, a decumb on the hedge and terraces leaving hardly a sparrow in their wake.

**Basal Studies From Skulls.**  
In recent years many anatomists have given much attention to solving the problem of reproducing from the skulls the faces of ancient peoples. Prof. C. W. M. Poynter of the University of Nebraska, some time ago gave three skulls to a sculptor with the request that he reconstruct the fleshy parts of the face and head according to the data published by Prof. Von Hugel of the University of Jena. Professor Poynter did not tell the artist that the three skulls were all of natives of North America. As a matter of fact, one, possibly by the Pleistocene age, was found by Robert F. Glider in a mound or river loam in Nebraska, one belonged to an Indian of pre-Columbian date, and one was that of a modern Indian. The photographs of the skulls were shown in all three cases the characteristic face of the American Indian. Whatever the age of the Nebraska skull may prove to be, its owner was undoubtedly a man of the Indian type.
