CARE OF INTERNED SUBJECTS IN FRANCE COSTS MANY MILLION

Paris, Oct. 1.-(Associated Press Correspondence.)-The supervision and support of subjects of belligerent countries interned or allowed to reside in France has given the government a vast amount of work and entailed an expense of approximately \$35,000,000 to date.

The government's policy has been to treat justly all subjects of countries at war with France residing within its territory at the outbreak of the war and to treat them as liberally as the necessary precautions for the nation's security would permit. The Associated Press is informed by minister of the Interior Marly, upon whom this great responsibility has devolved.

"At the beginning of hostilities," he continued, "it became necessary to intern in concentration camps 30,000 subjects of countries at war with France. That number has been reduced to less than 10,000."

"The Germans, Austrians and Turks who have merited the exceptional privileges of a residence permit have by the same measure escaped the duce to 14,000 by the repatriation of 16,000."

The number by agreement between the interested powers, and by according to other residence permits that seemed to be justified by their ethnological origin or other considerations.

"The Poles, Czechs and Alsacians, and the Austrians of Italian origin, natives of Trentino have benefited from these exceptional measures. Residence permits have been issued to 1,124 Germans and 576 Austrians. Some of them are naturalized Germans whose attitude towards France has been correct in all circumstances. Some are fathers of boys serving in our armies. Others are old and tried servants in French, English or American families who are vouched for by their employers.

There were 3,754 subjects of the Ottoman empire residing in France before the declaration of war by Turkey. All of these have been allowed to reside here with the exception of about 200 whose antecedents made their internment necessary in the interest of the national defense. The interned civilians were sent to 63 different camps widely distributed throughout the country, where they have been fed absolutely free of any cost to them and at an expense to the government of \$18,000 a month. They have also received all necessary medical attention free of charge. Some of these little colonies have even seen their numbers increased by births that have occurred under the most favorable conditions.

FRENCH WORKING ON PROBLEM OF CARING FOR MAIMED SOLDIERS

Saint-Maurice, Oct. 15.-(Associated Press Correspondence.)-The problem of caring for the army of maimed and disabled soldiers is being gradually worked out. The aim of the government is to make them self-supporting notwithstanding their infirmities. To this end the first necessity is functional readoption and professional re-education or physical training. A million francs (\$200,000) is being spent on this work. Here, not far from Paris, in the National Central Asylum and Military Hospital are quartered at present 835 men, about 135 of whom are cured and are learning new trades or professions in the various schools of the institutions. Other similar establishments will be put into operation at Bordeaux, Bayonne, Bourges, Montpellier, Rouen, Tours, Toulouse, Caen, Limoges, Nancy, Besancon, Saint-Etienne, Brest and Oran (Algeria).

The Saint-Maurice institution, created by Napoleon III and located in a large well-kept park, is admirably adapted with modern apparatus. Victims of paralysis, ankylosis, those whose tendons have been cut out and others suffering from various lesions may be seen working special machines, most of them made in the United States, to exercise stiff joints and bring back life to deadened muscles. In many cases after patient application to the treatment the members function normally. There is an ambulance for almost every conceivable complication resulting from a wound. Most of the patients are able to use them without aid after having been shown, then it is simply a case of sticking to it. The adjoining room is filled with the whirr of electric massage instruments manipulated by nurses.

On a concrete walk in the garden large footstools have been painted. These are a cure for locomotion disorders for soldiers who lost control of their legs through nerve shock or otherwise and who have to begin over again like a child. An outdoor swimming tank for those who need it and can stand it.
