John Doe, Heir to Gould Millions



John Doe, No. 104, abandoned child, aged four, whose parents, it is believed, live in Philadelphia, has become an heir to millions, because Mrs. Finley J. Shepard, who was Miss Helen Geald, worth perhaps \$10,000,000 from the fortune left by her famous father, has adopted him. The Shepards have no children. John Doe was found on the back steps of St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York by a policeman about a year ago. He gave his name so far as he could be understood as Austin McLeary. He talked of Broad street and mumbled about a ride on a train, a "big boat," and a "railroad in the air." So it was thought he had been taken from Philadelphia. However, no trace of his parents was found there. He was sent to St. Christopher's Home at Dobbs Ferry, near the home of the Shepards, and Mrs. Shepard adopted him. Now he is Finley J. Shepard, Jr. He has found not only a father and mother, but a fortune and social position.

ANOTHER ELECTION ON M'CORMICK COUNTY

Governor Manning Decides to Order Second One On December 14.

Greenwood, Oct. 28.—McCormick county advocates returned from Columbia last night highly elated over the quick decision of Governor Richard L. Manning to give them another election, on December 14th, on the new county. More than twenty of them went to the Capital City yesterday and laid their claims before the chief executive. Mr. Fraser Lyon was spokesman and the governor rendered his decision in their favor in about thirty minutes. The opposition side was not represented except through two letters to the governor protesting against the establishment of McCormick county. At the election December 14th there will be two more boxes than at the last election. These will be in Callson and Troy townships.
