ENTENTE ALLIES SEEM TO HAVE FAILED AGAIN

REPORTED RUMANIA WON'T
INTERVENE UNLESS HER
INTERESTS SUFFER

INTERNES THREE
RUSSIAN VESSELS

Two Torpedo Boats and One
Armed Steamship Berthed in
Waters of Danube.

Berlin, Nov. 4.—The Overseas News agency today announced that Rumania has ordered the internment of two Russian torpedo boats, and an armed steamship which are in Rumanian waters on the Danube, and that it had been semi-officially announced in Rumania that Rumania would not intervene unless her vital interests are menaced.

The agency states that general opinion is that this is proof that Rumania has declined the latest proposals of entente powers.

Big Port Developments Under Way in South.

(Manufacturers Record.) It is gratifying to note that a general recognition of the necessities of providing modern port facilities is being made by the coast cities of the south. There is still a long way to go before all of the seaports of America are equipped with such modern facilities as are to be found in European and South American ports, but the evidence of awakening interest is to be found to a greater or less extent in all of the Southern seaports. Expenditures aggregating millions of dollars are being made in ports from Baltimore to Arkansas Pass. New Orleans is completely rebuilding its terminals, warehouses and other port facilities and will be provided with a thoroughly modern plant for handling a vast volume of waterborne commerce.

While a conspicuous example of almost complete rehabilitation, the activities at New Orleans are but typical of what is being done, though on a smaller scale, in other Southern ports. Channels are being deepened, railway terminals and wharfage accommodations co-ordinated, million-dollar coal piers constructed, and all manner of facilities provided for doing business more nearly like it is done in the economically operated ports of Europe.

A great development is under way, with the promise of benefits to the South of far greater magnitude than is generally understood, even by the people of the South themselves.

Studying Serum From Snakes.

(Philadelphia Public Ledger.) Medical scientists interested in the discovery of an efficacious antidote for snake bites are risking their lives at the zoological gardens in Fairmount park, conducting experiments among the reptiles in the "snake house." Toxicologists the world over have been working for some time to perfect a serum.

How would you like to sit down at a table with a writhing rattlesnake before you, his fangs darting viciously in every direction, and busy yourself with extracting the "sting" from the reptile? This is the work of the scientist who risks his life for the sake of humanity. In order to work out a powerful serum the toxicologist has to have some of the deadly poison of the snake, and to get it he operates upon the live snake.

In 1843 Lucien Bonaparte first made an analysis of viperine venom and claimed it to be proteid in character, and 20 years later Dr. S. Weir Mitchell confirmed this statement after long series of analyses of the poison of the rattlesnake.

Since that time snake venoms have been the subject of discussion and research by the greatest toxicologists the world over, all endeavoring to discover a successful treatment to combat the swift and deadly properties of the poison. The importance of this work can be readily appreciated, inasmuch as more than 20,000 deaths are recorded annually in India as the result of bites from venomous snakes.

Doctor Calmette in India was the first to produce an anti-serum for snake venoms, after a series of experiments demonstrating that animals could be immunized by injecting a non-fatal dose of venom and gradually increasing until the animal would survive many times the usual dose.

CHINESE QUESTION SHOULD BE DECIDED BEFORE END OF YEAR

Peking, Oct. 30.—(Associated Press Correspondence.)—The question whether China is to be a monarchy or a republic should be settled before the end of the year, according to the state council, which has recommended that, in accordance with the terms of the provisional constitution, President Yuan Shi-kai should call a citizens' convention to decide the question, but if it is not possible to call such a convention at this time, the state council recommends that the president waive the provision and "advise other proper and adequate means to consult the will of the people."

It is rumored that this is designed to permit the president to convert the council of state into a convention and have it adopt a new constitution embracing the monarchical provision, according to his wishes.

The memorandum sent by the state council, sitting as a legislature or parliament under the president's direction, says that in all eighty-two petitions favoring a monarchy have been received from different bodies.

The memorandum is taken as a general indication that the monarchy may be established much sooner than has been predicted. President Yuan Shi-kai however has not taken any action.

Many of the papers printed in English in various foreign concessions continue to vigorously assail the proposed monarchy on the ground that it is specially dangerous for China, to make any change while world politics is at such white heat. Other papers printed in English accept the monarchical movement as inevitable and are urging that wholesale reforms be carried out by the government regardless of whether it be called a republic or a monarchy.

Members of the society for the preservation of peace, the organization that originally fathomed the monarchical movement, are still working actively in Peking without opposition from the government. They recently held a luncheon at the most prominent foreign hotel in Peking in honor of delegates from the provinces who have come to the capital to confer about the monarchical proposition. This luncheon was attended by one hundred and fifty men. No member of the cabinet was present, neither did any other government officials of high rank attend. The delegates formed a sort of union for the discussion of governmental question, and engaged in speech-making for several hours.

Foreign criticism of the movement and the general belief that several foreign powers would withhold their recognition of the monarchy have nettled the leaders.

An editorial in the Peking Daily News discussing foreign critics says: "They mistake the shadow for the substance, raise dolorous cries when it is proposed to give an authentic definition to China's system of government, and to abandon the pretence that it is republicanism. It is putting our credulity to too severe a strain to ask us to believe that two hundred and fifty million people in China would be frantically indignant if it were decided to describe correctly, the system of government under which order has been brought out of chaos. To speak frankly, China is enjoying the monarchical system today, but the country describes itself as a republic and consequently the system would fall to pieces on the death of the ruler if no provision were made for its maintenance. That provision can be made without danger or loss of time simply by abandoning the fatuous pretences that the system that prevails is republicanism."

The opponents of the monarchical system estimate one hundred million dollars, or about forty million dollars in gold, as the probable expense of restoring a monarchy, but the proponents say that this big figure is based on the cost of entrenchment in ancient times. When a new emperor came to the throne in China, he always renounced the land for the year of his enthronement. These taxes alone make up for the greater part of the one hundred million dollar estimate. Yang Tu and other leaders of the society for the preservation of peace say it will not be necessary under present conditions to remit the land tax for entrenchment year.

WORLD'S CHAMPION EGG LAYER

Lady E. Lantine, a White Leghorn, Yields 814 in a Year.

With a record of 314 eggs in 365 days, Lady E. Lantine, a White Leghorn pullet, became today the champion egg layer of the world.

The little hen, which weighs three and a half pounds completed her work of an egg laying competition at Delaware College, Newark, Del., and beat the previous record of 286 eggs by 28. The pen of five hens, of which she was a member also broke the American pen record with 1,211 eggs. The average baryard fowl produces only 76 eggs in a year.

BIG PROHIBITION RALLY TO BE HELD HERE SOON

ARIDNESS TO SPEAK

One-Time Candidate for President
On Dry Platform Will Deliver Address.

A rally for the cause of National Prohibition will be held in Anderson on Sunday, November 14. This meeting will probably be the biggest meeting for this cause ever held in this city. Preparations are being made to entertain an enormous crowd at this time.

The rally is a mass meeting, will be held under the auspices of the National Anti-Saloon League, together with the ministers of Anderson city and of Anderson county.

Hon. John G. Wooley, one time candidate for president, who ran on a prohibition platform, will be in Anderson and will deliver an address. Mr. Wooley is one of the foremost speakers of the Anti-Saloon League and his coming to Anderson is considered an important event by many people who have heard him argue for this cause. He will be accompanied by Rev. George C. Morrow, of Detroit, who has been field secretary of the league for the past 18 years. Mr. Morrow will also make an address in this city.

Whether the mass meeting will be held in the court house or in one of the churches has not been decided. A committee of the local pastors has been formed to make the necessary arrangements for the coming of the two speakers for the meeting.

This meeting will be held in Greenwood on Sunday. The speakers go about through the country and make addresses and hold meetings in the cause of national prohibition at any town they can secure a large audience. They have been long at this work, and are very enthusiastic over results that have been accomplished.

STORING COTTON
Greenwood Farmers Are Holding
Staple.

Since the drop in price Greenwood county farmers are storing their cotton in the local warehouse. The total to date are 8,322 bales, 400 of which were stored yesterday.

When the market was bringing 12 cents and a little over nearly everybody sold, but since the decline scenes at the warehouse remind one of the days last fall during the time when practically no cotton was marketed.

The general opinion seems to be that the market will yet go beyond 12 cents.—Greenwood Journal.
