ASPHALT CREW SOON TO MOVE TO GREENVILLE ST.

WORK ON RIVER STREET TO BE COMPLETED SOME TIME FRIDAY

TRACK PAVING

Is Progressing Nicely and Will Likely Be Finished By December 6th.

If the plans of the paving company carry, the paving on River street will be finished some time Friday. The binder is now being placed on the south side of the street between Kennedy street and Coughlin avenue.

On the north side of the street the binder has already been placed as far as Coughlin avenue. The foreman of the concrete gang on Greenville street expects to finish the concrete base on that street by tonight, and the crew will then be moved to Manning street. Part of the base has already been laid on Manning street but the work was held up because of a water main which had to be placed.

From River street the asphalt crew will go to Greenville street and will work steadily ahead. It takes a little longer to heat the sand in cold weather in mixing the asphalt and this work can not be carried on as fast in extreme cold weather, therefore, the paving company is anxious to get the job finished as soon as possible.

The work on North Main street is progressing rapidly. The street car track crew is at work and the city's force is putting in the drains and removing the old Belgian blocks. The crew on West Whitner street is making good progress, having completed the concrete work almost as far as the power house. When this and the track work on North Main is completed, all of the track paving will be completed. If the weather is favorable, it is hoped to have all of this done by December 6.

BICYCLE COLLIDED WITH A DRAY WAGON

Young James Elliott Probably Fatally Injured Yesterday Afternoon.

James Elliott, the young brother of John Elliott, formerly proprietor of the Olympia ice cream parlor, was seriously and probably fatally injured yesterday afternoon when his bicycle collided with a dray wagon on Market street. The boy was still unconscious last night and it was said that the physicians were doubtful as to his recovery.

James Elliott is employed by the Bee Hive in the capacity of delivery boy and makes deliveries on a bicycle. Yesterday afternoon about 7:30 o'clock he was riding down Main street and turned into Market. Coming out of Market street was a dray wagon and the boy ran into it, the shafts striking the boy in the abdomen. This caused him to be hurled violently to the ground, his head striking hard. There are several bruises on his head and he seems to be pretty well bruised up. The shafts did not enter the boy's side.

The young man was knocked unconscious and he was carried across to the city hall by the driver of the wagon. A physician was summoned and his injuries attended to, but last night it was reported that he was still unconscious.

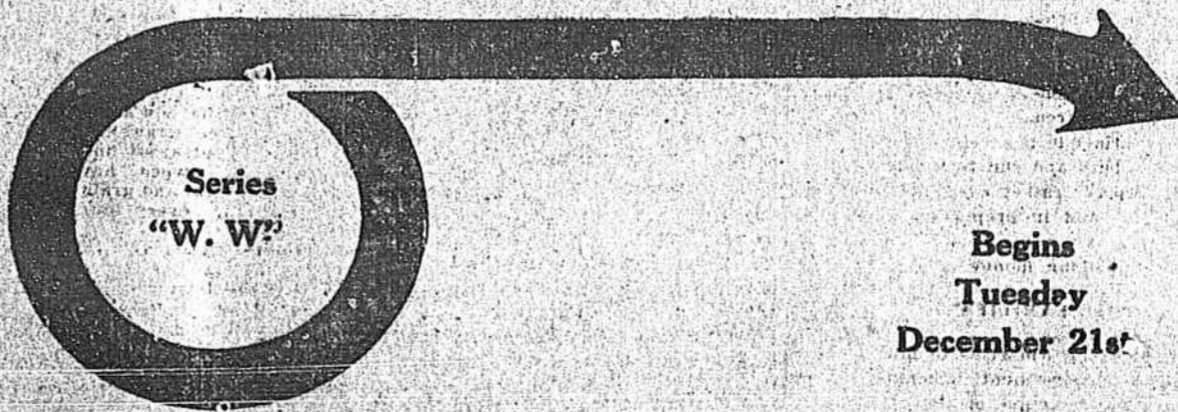
