Are Investigating Brogon Mill Strike

GOVERNMENT MEN ARRIVED
IN CITY YESTERDAY
MORNING

WILL ATTEMPT TO
LOCATE TROUBLE

Have Been in Greenville for Jud-
son Mill Trouble and Are
Now in Anderson.

Messrs. John P. Colpoys and Charles Bonheim, commissioners of conciliation of the United States, arrived in Anderson yesterday morning shortly before the noon hour, their visit being for the purpose of investigating the trouble at the Brogon mill. They returned to Greenville yesterday afternoon but will come back to Anderson today to make further investigations.

These men came south to investigate the strikes at the Judson mill in Greenville and at the Brogon mill in Anderson. They represent the United States department of commerce and labor, and their trip is merely for investigation and not for settlement directly.

Messrs. Colpoys and Bonheim arrived in Greenville last Friday and since that time have been investigating both sides of the Judson mill trouble. These gentlemen gather up all the facts as best they can by talking with the operatives and the mill management. They then report to Washington the result of their investigations. Since the arrival of these men in Greenville the Judson mill has resumed operations but it is not known whether their trip had anything to do with this.

In Anderson these gentlemen will confer with both the mill management and the operatives and will attempt to get at the bottom of the whole matter. Whether their trip will result in a settlement remains to be seen.

"We can tell you nothing except that we are only here to make investigations," stated Mr. Colpoys to a representative of The Intelligencer yesterday. "We have nothing to say beyond the fact that we will report the result of our investigations to the proper authorities in Washington and if there is anything to be given out to the press as a result, it will be announced by those officials. We are now on our way to the Brogon mill and will return to Greenville this afternoon but will come back to Anderson tomorrow.

Messrs. Colpoys and Bonheim left the city for Greenville yesterday afternoon at 4:50 o'clock.

LABOON MURDER CASE NOT YET GIVEN JURY

JUDGE WILL MAKE CHARGE
THIS MORNING WHEN
COURT CONVENES

TWO PLEAD GUILTY

One Violation Dispensary Law
and Another for Larceny—True
Bill Returned Gentry Case.

The Laboon murder case occupied the attention of court all of yesterday, the solicitor finishing his argument for the state just before court took a recess yesterday afternoon at 6 o'clock. This morning when court convenes Judge Moore will charge the jury. It will be remembered that Walter and Will Laboon are charged with the murder of a negro in the upper section of the county. The case was tried at the last term of court of general sessions but resulted in a mistrial. Thirteen witnesses were examined for the state and 18 for the defense. Messrs. Greene and Earle are attorneys for the defense and Solicitor Smith for the state.

Solicitor Smith announced yesterday morning that owing to some important plats of land involved in the Bowden case, it would be continued over to next term.

The following entered pleas of guilty yesterday:
Emma Frazier plead guilty to violation of the dispensary law and she was sentenced to three months at hard labor or pay a fine of \$100, \$50 of which was suspended during good behavior.

Mack Anderson and George Washington plead guilty to larceny and were sentenced to 12 months.

The following bills were returned by the grand jury yesterday:

Jess Cochran, assault and battery with intent to kill and carrying concealed weapons, true bill.

Sam Griffin, larceny, true bill.

Peter Broyles and Jim Jones, larceny, true bill.

Emma Frazier, violation dispensary law, true bill.

Ernest Gentry and Reed Shaw, murder, true bill.
