Witnesses Examined In The Jones' Case

ARGUMENTS WILL BE MADE THIS MORNING WHEN COURT MEETS

MRS. JONES WENT ON STAND ALSO

Also Mrs. McCalla—Many Objections Made By Prosecution to Testimony of Defense.

Yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock, all of the witnesses in the Feaster Jones case having been examined, and both the prosecution and defense thinking that not much more progress could be made until this morning, Judge Moore decided to suspend the work on this case until this morning at 9:30. Arguments will then be made and the case will be in the hands of the jury.

Jones is charged with killing Dr. L. O. McCalla at Starr and he was arraigned yesterday morning at 9:30. Every foot of standing room in the court room was taken and there were throngs of people at each entrance trying to gain admittance. This case is attracting more attention than any case ever tried in Anderson county.

Solicitor Proctor Bonham of Greenville and Messrs. Brazeele and Pearman of this city are assisting Solicitor K. P. Smith in the prosecution. The defendant is represented by Watkins & Prince and Watkins, Bonham & Allen. The arguments will be made this morning by Proctor Bonham, T. Frank Watkins, General Bonham and K. P. Smith, in the order named.

It took nearly two hours to draw the jury. Upon the request of Solicitor Smith each juror was sworn upon his voir dire. Following are the jurors selected: P. Gable, J. Clyde Green, G. W. Cox, J. Frank Bolt, J. C. King, J. C. Finson, W. S. Flemming, J. E. Garvin, C. L. Cobb, C. M. Welborn, Jno. A. McGill and R. W. Ambrose. Judge Moore asked Mr. J. E. Garvin to act as foreman.

The following jurors were rejected by the state: W. S. Adams, F. C. Boggs, R. L. Hogg, C. C. Watt, G. C. Rainey.

The defense excused the following: D. P. Sloan, P. L. Yoa, A. S. Catcart, H. L. Webb, T. J. Williford, S. B. Elrod, W. B. Hicks. The court excused the following: J. E. Segle, L. Reed Jackson, R. A. Banister, J. P. McCowan, C. C. Kay.

Immediately after the jurors were sworn Solicitor Smith read the indictment, which charged murder and the carrying of a concealed weapon. Immediately afterwards the first witness was sworn.

The first witness to take the stand for the state was Dr. J. R. Young. Dr. Young said: "I have been living in Anderson county for about the past ten years and am a practicing physician. I was called to make an autopsy after death of Dr. L. O. McCalla at Starr. I found his dead body in garage in the yard. Found two wounds, one in the abdomen and one in head. The first bullet entered just below the lower rib, passed through the liver, ranged downward and lodged in the spinal column, passing through the main artery. This shot would have caused death. The second wound was in his right temple, just above right eyebrow. The bullet passed through head and came out behind. In my opinion either or both of these wounds would have caused death. The bullet was of .38 calibre or larger."

Dr. J. N. Land sworn said: "I live at Starr in Anderson county and have lived there for the past ten years. I was called to form autopsy on body of Dr. McCalla. Found bullet wound entering right side just below ribs, ranging inward and upward, passing through liver and lodging in spinal column. Other bullet entered right temple, penetrated skull and passed out behind. First wound was sufficient to have caused death. Some people might live for one minute. In my mind these wounds caused death. Body was found in yard in garage. Door garage is about ten feet wide and garage is about twenty-five feet deep. Is about 200 feet from residence. I got there few minutes after shooting and body was lying in door, with head outside and feet pointing toward rear of garage."

Pistol turned over to authorities here exhibited and offered in evidence. Dr. Land testified that wounds seemed to have been made by bullets of same size as those used in this gun, a .45 calibre.

Jim Reed sworn said: "I live at Starr and was working for Dr. McCalla on October 9. He and I came from station together, and after we drove up in yard he got out and went into garage. I saw Mr. Feaster Jones coming across road from his house. He came on up and went into garage. Heard first shot in about five minutes. I got out of buggy and saw second shot. Dr. McCalla's head was in door and as Mr. Jones passed out he shot second time. I saw pistol in right hand, but nothing in left. I left about this time and did not see Mrs. McCalla. This happened in Anderson county and it was between 8 and 9 o'clock."

Cross questions by Mr. Watkins for defense Reed testified: "Mr. Jones was about 200 feet away when I first saw him. He went in garage about five minutes before automobile was rolled out by Red Jones. Was placed about 60 feet away. The automobile was in the garage when Mr. Jones came up."

Solicitor Smith questioned again for state and Reed said: "Dr. McCalla had on his gloves." By defense again: "He had on the gloves when he left the buggy." Solicitor Smith questioned again and question and Reed said that the pistol placed in evidence looked like the one Mr. Jones had. Elberoe Asbury sworn testified: "I was working for Dr. McCalla on 9th of October. Mr. Jones, Dr. McCalla and he were in the garage and Mr. Feaster asked Dr. McCalla about the clutch on the automobile. About this time doctor sent me in the house to get some envelopes. Heard shots and saw body. I do not know whether he had on gloves or not. It took started. I was cranking and Mr. Feaster helped charge it. Lee Jones drove car out and I went with him, then on in house. Was on back porch when shots were fired. Garage is about 100 yards away. I waited on envelopes. Mrs. McCalla came out and went to Mr. Jones who was walking toward his home. Mr. Feaster told Mrs. McCalla that he had shot Uncle Larrie. Mrs. McCalla then went to the doctor and sent me for a doctor. I did not see Jim Reed, but he was in buggy when I went in house."

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Cross examination: "Mr. Feaster Jones asked him why he did not have clutch fixed and not Lee Jones." Fabe Burris sworn said: "I was in barn across road on October 9 and was working in there. I wanted to see Dr. McCalla and kept watching for him to come back. He drove up and I did not see him. Shortly after that I saw the buggy and about same time saw Mr. Feaster walking up. Heard talking in garage but could not hear what they said. Reed Jones backed car out and about that time he got out of car. Heard first shot, and then second one. Saw Mr. Jones going toward his home. Saw Mrs. McCalla come out and she asked Mr. Jones what he had done. He said, 'I have shot Uncle Larrie.' He had pistol in hand when he came out and started home."

Cross examination: "This happened between 8 and 9 o'clock. Reed brought out automobile. He did not go back into garage but went toward it and got almost there." Questioned by state again: "This happened after Jones went out and he was not in garage when shots were fired. I think Dr. McCalla had on gloves."

Defense again: "A public road runs between the barn I was in and the garage. The barn is about 50 feet away." M. H. Sexton sworn said: "I live near Starr and have lived there for six years. I went up to Dr. McCalla's on morning of trouble. Found body lying in front part of garage, head just outside and feet toward back of it. Examined ground beneath head and found bullet and little piece of skull buried about one inch in dirt. Got there about one-half hour after shooting. I do not know anything else about it."

Cross examination by defense: "Dr. McCalla's body was put on cot just after I got there." J. Olin Sanders, deputy sheriff, sworn said: "I went to Starr and arrested defendant, Feaster Jones. Got there about 9:30 and body was on cot in garage. Foot of blood on ground just outside. We dug and found bullet and little piece of skull. Here little piece of skull was offered in evidence."

Mr. Sanders continuing said: "Mr. Jones was in front yard when arrest was made. Pistol had been fired twice, two empty shells and four loaded ones were found in it. Went immediately after I was notified. Think Dr. McCalla had one glove on."

Cross examination: "They were thin kid gloves. Examined clothes of Dr. McCalla and found watch, chain, stick pin, spectacle case, little money, cartridges from .32 Winchester, magazine which goes in automatic pistol loaded. Found Dr. McCalla's satchel in buggy about 35 feet away. Found Mr. Jones in front yard, he surrendered and we went in house and got pistol and satchel."

By state again: "Found cartridges in doctor's pocket but no weapon. Pistol was found in buggy, also one pint of whiskey and a few papers. This was after I arrested Mr. Jones." Reeves Chamberle sworn said: "Have been living in county about 32 years and now live at Starr. I got to McCalla's home about ten minutes after shooting occurred. Had on gloves when I saw body. Saw Feaster Jones walking up to McCalla's home and he asked me to take automobile and go after his mother-in-law. We were about 30 yards from McCalla's home and Feaster went up in that direction. Mrs. McCalla said, 'Feaster, my God, why did you do that?' Feaster told Lucius Todd to take it inside. I then cranked up my machine and went after Mrs. Deane."

By defense: "Dr. McCalla's hand was pulled back. Barn is about 100 feet from garage." By state again: "That home is where Dr. McCalla lived." Again by defense: "I saw Dr. McCalla's satchel in buggy."

Again by state: "It is a large barn and the doctor rode around a good deal. Buggy was about 40 feet away from garage." Solicitor Smith then announced that there were no further witnesses for the state.

The Defense Open Case. Feaster J. Jones went on the stand about 12:30 and said: "I am 25 years of age and have lived at Starr all my life, except that time I was away at school. Attended Wofford college and Anderson. Met Miss Allen McCalla in my Aunt's store who has always been a mother to me, having raised me."
