## WITNESSES EXAMINED

### IN THE JONES' CASE

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE TWO.)

me since I was a baby. She has lived at Starr ever since I can remember. Her first husband was Preston Allen, who died while I was at Wofford. She married Dr. McCalla about seven or eight years ago. I lived there with them until I got my home built. I married February was six years ago. Married Miss Corrie Dean, who lived at Deans two miles above Starr. Her mother, one brother and one sister live there now. Her father is dead. We have one little daughter Mrs. McCalla has no children but Dr. McCalla has one son who lived there with them. My home is about 150 yards from Mrs. McCalla's and is just across the road. Dr. and Mrs. McCalla and our family have been mighty friendly and we took Sunday dinner there real often. When we went away we usually left our little daughter there with them. On Thursday, October 7, I got up about the usual time and went up to Dr. McCalla's. He asked me if I was going to Anderson and I said I was. He said he had to go also and we came together. I attended to some business for myself and a little for him. We had dinner together at the Acme cafe. There was nothing unfriendly between us at that time. We returned to Starr about 2 o'clock. I went up to Aunt Bessie's and then on home. Up at Aunt Bessie's there was Mrs. Keys, Mrs. West Harper, my wife, Mrs. Gross and Mrs. McCalla. Mrs. Harper was going home and had to be taken to train. Dr. McCalla cranked up car and drove it around to front of house. I was called over and was asked to drive them to the train at Dr. McCalla's request because he had to go off. No one was left at the McCalla home except Mrs. Gross, who is about 70 years of age, my wife and Dr. McCalla. We were gone about 25 minutes. When I got back to the house my wife was sitting in Aunt Bessie's bed room at a desk. When I left she was in the parlor, also Mrs. Gross. Dr. McCalla was standing in back yard. I went in bath room, then to postoffice to get mail. When I got back Dr. McCalla was standing in yard under tree and my wife was going home. I had my pony cart there and on way home asked my wife to ride with me. She declined. When I got home I left buggy in yard and went inside. I noticed that one side of wife's face was red and was scratched up and it was not that way when I went to the depot. I asked her what was the matter with it and she said—

Here prosecution objected to what Mrs. Jones told her husband as to the cause of condition of face. Jones continuing said: "She claimed fire caused right side of face to be red. Right side was next fire when I left. Later I noticed pink powder on both sides, it appearing that she had tried to make both sides look the same. I then went back over Aunt Bessie's and asked Mrs. Gross—"

Prosecution objected to what defendant asked Mrs. Gross, over ruled by court.  
Continuing Mr. Jones said: "I made inquiries as to Dr. McCalla's whereabouts while I was at depot and I learned that he had not gone off but had stayed at home and it was said that my wife had gone to the back of house to hunt some medicine for him. My wife was sick later in the afternoon about dark. She appeared to be nervous and Dr. Dean attended her. In regard to my state of mind will say that I was worried and on Friday became more so. It seems that the tales were conflicting. I ate little. In afternoon I went to drug store and when I came back my wife was talking over telephone with Dr. McCalla—"

State objected.  
"I could not understand why she was talking over telephone with him when I know everyone at his home was away. On Friday night about 11 o'clock I talked with her about an hour and asked for an explanation as to her relations with Dr. McCalla. We were in our room and little daughter was asleep in bed."

Here state objected as to what wife told him. It being 1:30 o'clock court took a recess until 3 o'clock.  
**ADD 4 JONES CASE.**

**Afternoon Session.**  
Mr. Jones was returned to the stand and defense asked that he again state what happened on Friday.  
Mr. Jones said: "I questioned my wife closely about what had happened on Thursday and asked for an explanation. She finally confessed to me. She broke down and told me she was guilty of having improper relations with Dr. McCalla on Thursday. She finally told me of the other occasion. I went and looked out toward the McCalla home and it was dark. I asked her why she did it and she said: 'I could not help it; God knows I wish I was dead.' I sat up a long time after that and knuckled. I finally went to bed but could not sleep. Did not eat much breakfast next morning. I saw Dr. McCalla in his yard and went back in my house and got pistol. I started over there but did not see him then. Later I saw him drive up in buggy and went toward house. Dr. McCalla drove up with negro and he got out and went into garage. Shortly after wards I went in and Red Jones could not crank her. I showed him how and he and another man drove it out. Dr. McCalla and I were then in the garage by ourselves. Dr. McCalla started toward door and I called him. He asked me what was the matter and I told him I was going to kill him. He asked what for and I told him because he had treated my wife as he had. He said that he had never touched her and had always treated her as one of his children. I told him he was lying because my wife had told me all about it. He then said that I could not afford to tell him on Aunt Bessie's account. He

started to call Red Jones and I told him that if he did I would not give him time to pray. Red came up and I told him to go back. Dad took a step forward and when he did I shot Dr. McCalla. He fell backward and started to struggling. I passed out and then shot the second time. Aunt Bessie came out and wanted to know what was the matter and I told her that I had killed Uncle Larrie. I went home, called the sheriff and telephoned Dr. Dean to go to Aunt Bessie. When Mr. Sanders came I surrendered to him. I cannot describe my feelings when I went over to kill Dr. McCalla. Mr. Watkins came down about 9:30 but I did not telephone him."

Cross examination by state: "After shooting I went home and telephoned Sheriff Ashley and Dr. Dean. I did not come to Anderson on Friday. On Thursday I called Mr. Pool for Dr. McCalla and asked something about the price of cotton. Dr. McCalla wanted to know because he had some to sell. I did not eat supper there Friday night. Do not remember going to McCalla home Friday evening. Confession by my wife was made about 11 o'clock at night and I went up to see Dr. McCalla about 8:30 on Saturday morning. I went there with the intention of killing him and carried my biggest pistol. There were two other pistols in the house but I got the biggest. I bought this pistol last spring after the Dr. affair. When I went to the garage I helped them crank the car and then stayed in there with Dr. McCalla. I accused him about my wife. He denied it and called Red Jones. He fell with his face up with head just outside of garage. Aunt Bessie came out and asked me what I had done. In few minutes saw Reaves Chumblee and asked him to go after Mrs. Dean to stay with my wife. Aunt Bessie was standing about in the yard and I asked Mrs. Land and Dean to take her inside. After I suspected my wife on Thursday I do not know whether I was up there on Friday or not. I told my wife I would not do anything to her if she would tell me the truth. I did not tell her anything about killing Dr. McCalla for it. I do not know how long it took me to cause her to confess. If I had made up mind to kill Dr. McCalla before I started up there I was not aware of it. I did not care as to whether it was against the law to carry pistol or not. I was badly torn up and was worried to death and did not think about that part of it. I am a beneficiary under Mrs. McCalla's will but I did not know how much property she had. I did not think about the fact that Mrs. McCalla would benefit financially because of death Dr. McCalla and therefore never thought about my part as beneficiary of will. No Mrs. McCalla is in better health now than she has been for some time past. Both of them were about 60 years old. I know he had last year's cotton. He raised it. I do not know how many mules he had. He had about \$11,000 mortgages on my property but that is not heavy."

Questioned by defense again: "If my property was sold it would bring about \$20,000 or \$40,000."  
**Dr. Dean's Testimony.**  
Dr. Dean sworn: "I am a practicing physician and live at Starr. I have been Mrs. Jones' physician for about five years."

On question as to whether he got call to attend Mrs. Jones on Friday and as to her condition objected to by state. Sustained by court. Court ruled, however, that defense had right to prove what was reported to defendant as physical condition of Mrs. Jones.

Dr. Dean continued: "I told Feaster that his wife was suffering from a nervous collapse for some reason. I did not know what. I called Mr. Frank Watkins myself."  
Here court ruled that defendant's wife's confession to her brother, Dr. Dean, was not competent. No questions by state.

Mrs. Jones testified "I am the wife of Feaster L. Jones and we were married seven years ago next February. We have been living where we are now for five years, which is a short distance from McCama home. Relations between the families has been friendly, the same as parents to children."  
State objected to relations between families but court over ruled.  
Question whether or not Dr. McCalla had improper relations objected to by state. Also question as to whether she did or not attempt to resist his advances.

Mrs. Jones continuing: "On Thursday, October 7, I took dinner with Mrs. McCalla. Feaster and Dr. McCalla were away. I was in parlor by fire with Mrs. Gross then they came in to depot. When Dr. McCalla came in I knew he had not gone to depot."  
Right here court ruled that defense could not prove what happened between Mrs. Jones and Dr. McCalla. Objection by state in regard to what she told defendant about condition of face overruled.

Mrs. Jones: "Feaster asked me about my face—"  
On question by defense as to whether what she told him was truth objected to by state. Sustained by court.  
Mrs. Jones: "I told him the fire had burned it and he said that the other side was to be. On Thursday night I told him that Dr. McCalla did not have house while they were gone to the depot but I did not know where he was. Husband looked worried and nervous and as little next day. I told him Dr. McCalla had called me over telephone. Thursday night I had physical collapse and called for Dr. Dean. On Friday night Feaster asked about my relations with Dr. McCalla and I did not tell him at first. He was real nervous and accused and finally I confessed to improper relations with Dr. McCalla, my time being on McCama's property. On Saturday morning Feaster was very worried and as little next day. I did not know he was going to kill Dr. McCalla."

Cross examination by state: "I confessed to Feaster about 10 o'clock. He did not tell me what he would do to Dr. McCalla, but said he would not hurt me. I told him that it had happened on two different occasions. I was not at McCalla's on Friday night. Our little daughter was up there for awhile and Feaster went after her but came right back. Feaster did not come to Anderson on Friday, Dr. and Mrs. McCalla came and brought our child."  
By defense: "I told Feaster that I could not help doing it and that I wished I was dead."

Mrs. Bessie McCalla.  
Mrs. McCalla examined: "Yes, I raised Feaster Jones."

State objected to question as to whether she knew of the relations of Dr. McCalla and Mrs. Jones. Sustained. Objections as to whether she even spoke of it to Feaster. Not sustained. She testified that she did not speak to Feaster. Testified that she spoke to Dr. McCalla about it but court ruled that this was incompetent.

Mrs. McCalla: "Dr. McCalla asked Feaster to take us to the train on Thursday afternoon because he said he had to go off. When we got back Mrs. Jones and Dr. McCalla were in house."

No questions by state.  
C. C. Jones sworn said: "I live at Starr and am a cousin of Feaster Jones. I am familiar with the location of the place and McCalla home is about 250 or 300 yards from Jones. Garage is about 100 yards from house. Garage is about 100 or 150 feet from barn where Rube Burris was. If negro was on north side and was looking through door he could have seen what he testified. I saw the catch in buggy Dr. McCalla generally carried it with him."  
No questions by state.

Sheriff Ashley sworn said: "I am sheriff of Anderson county and on Saturday morning, October 9, Feaster Jones called me up. He told me that he had killed his Uncle Larrie."  
State objected to question of defense as to what appeared to be Jones' physical condition by conversation over phone. Over ruled.  
Sheriff Ashley: "He called me about 8:30 o'clock and appeared to be very nervous and excited from his talk."

Cross examination by state: "He told me to come down to Starr because he had killed his uncle. He did not tell me to tell his lawyer."  
The defense announced that it had closed its case.

After consultation between attorneys on both sides, Judge Moore decided to suspend work on this case until this morning.
