BIBLE CLASS BANQUET WAS A GRAND SUCCESS

MR. R. S. LIGON WAS AGAIN
RE-ELECTED TEACHER
FOR YEAR

OTHER OFFICERS

Were Elected—Affair Was Best
of Kind Ever Given at
St. John's.

The annual banquet of the Wesley Bible class of St. John's Methodist church, given last evening at the church, was the biggest and best affair of its kind ever held at St. John's. There were about 125 present, many being kept away on account of the condition of the weather.

The supper was prepared by the members of the Philathea class, and it consisted of one of the most elaborate menus ever served in Anderson. There was oyster cocktail, turkey, ham, and all that goes with a turkey supper, all served hot. The dessert consisted of plum pudding with whipped cream.

After the banquet was finished the nominating committee, consisting of W. C. Brown, S. L. Prince and J. M. Evans, nominated R. S. Ligon for reelection of the class. Previously Mr. Ligon had stated to the class that owing to the condition of his health, he felt that he could not carry on these duties as he should, therefore, offered his resignation. The class felt like it could not give Mr. Ligon up and unanimously reelected him. Mr. Ligon responded and stated that he felt as if he could not let his own feelings prevent him from accepting such a token of love and an enthusiastic re-election.

A. H. Dagnall was nominated and elected as assistant teacher. Mr. Dagnall responded in a happy speech. He stated that he had been elected to a position he hoped he would never serve, and that he knew if he ever did have to serve, it would be for one time only, that being enough for the class.

J. H. Geiger, former assistant teacher, was nominated and elected president of class. He responded in a very appropriate speech.

W. C. Bryles was nominated and elected treasurer. He made a speech.

B. B. Bleckley was nominated and re-elected as secretary.

The members of the class then stood and gave 15 rabs for the officers.

Mr. Carter of Dillon, who is a traveling man and also a Sunday school worker of note, was present and addressed the class, complimenting them on such a splendid affair.

Mr. C. Ban Allen, formerly president of the class, acted as toastmaster and called on the Rev. W. C. Kirkland, who made a very appropriate talk.

Mr. R. E. Ligon was the next to be called upon. He stated that in coming to the banquet he was making his annual visit to the Wesley class. However, he stated that he felt proud of the part his brother was taking and was glad that he was re-elected as teacher.

Mr. O. M. Heard, superintendent of the Sunday school, was the next speaker and he gave a little school history. He stated that he had been superintendent for six years and that before Mr. Spenke became pastor he was never able to get the attendance to reach over 300. However, since the present pastor had taken charge, they had gotten together, made plans, and as a result the attendance had reached the high mark of over 1,000. He stated that he wanted to give Mr. Spenke credit for this, and said that he felt like it would be a charity to the church if the present pastor was not returned to St. John's church for another year.

As a result, the class voted that the presiding elder be asked to try to have the Rev. Mr. Spenke returned to the Anderson church.

Mr. Dagnall then arose and stated that he had been requested to call on Mr. Ban Allen for a speech. Mr. Allen responded very admirably.

After this speech the class arose and gave three cheers for St. John's church. The hymn "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" was then sung, and the benediction was pronounced by Rev. W. C. Kirkland.
