SUPPOSED AGENTS ARE PLACED IN JAIL

WHILE TAKING ORDERS FOR ENLARGING PICTURES ALSO STEAL

ARE NOW IN JAIL

Man and Woman in Belton are Placed in Jail on Charge of Having Stolen Ring.

SUPPOSED AGENTS... News reached the city last night of a robbery in Belton which is rather unusual. A couple, said to be Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Todd, representatives of a portrait firm in Chicago, Ill., called at the home of Mr. Clarence Pinson, a prominent farmer near Belton, yesterday morning to obtain an order for a photograph to be enlarged. They were invited in and after talking for a short time, Mrs. Pinson left the room in which they were in to go to another to get the picture. She came back and in a few minutes the agents left. A short time after the agents departed, Mrs. Pinson missed a diamond ring which was in a case on the bureau in the room where the agents had been and started a search. Failing to find the diamond, she notified her husband who went to Belton and had a warrant sworn out before Magistrate Kay. Last night the couple returned to their boarding place in Belton and the warrant was served. The ring was found on the person of a third party who is said to represent the same company, but who was not with the agents yesterday morning. He stated that the woman had given him the ring to keep. The couple were lodged in jail and a preliminary will be given this morning.

"THE TRAIL OF THE LONESOME PINE"

BRITISH STEAMER SUNK

Report for November Shows the Number as Fifty-three. London, Dec. 2.—Two more British steamers, the Colenso and the Orange Prince, have been sunk presumably by submarines. The latest report to the board of trade during November shows fifty-three British steamers were sunk with a loss of 646 lives. In the same period the loss of thirty-five sailing vessels was reported. So far the figures show only the twenty of the steamers sunk by German warships, and ten by mines but 495 lives lost on ships sunk by warship. The figures do not record the total for November, but concern only reports received during that month.

Greece Given Waralog. Athens, Dec. 2.—Representatives of Austria and Germany informed the Greek government that if the demands of the quadruple entente were granted the central powers will "cease to consider Greece Macedonia as friendly territory" according to the Noen Asty.

Total British Losses. London, Dec. 2.—In answer to the question in the house of commons Premier Asquith gave a written reply stating that the British casualties from the war numbered 540,320 killed wounded and missing. This is somewhat under the number unofficially reported.

QUESTION OF BRIDGE ACROSS THE SAVANNAH

SUPERVISOR KING HAS WRITTEN LETTER TO SUPERVISOR WILSON

WAS RECOMMENDED

Last Presentment Anderson County Grand Jury Doubtless Action Be Taken.

Supervisor J. Mack King has addressed a letter to Supervisor Wilson of Hart county, Georgia, calling the latter's attention to the fact that in the presentment of the grand jury of the last term of court it was recommended that the Anderson county officials take up with the proper authorities in Georgia the matter of building a bridge over Savannah river. In this letter Mr. King asks that the Hart county supervisor suggest a date when the two will get together and discuss this question. The people generally in Anderson county are of the opinion that something definite will be done about this bridge question this time and that within a few months actual work will be under way. This question has been agitated for years past, Hart county being ready and willing at different times to go her share. One of the questions which is already being much discussed is that of where the bridge will be located. Supervisor King's letter to Supervisor Wilson follows: "Dear Sir:—At the recent term of court for this county, the grand jury made some recommendations in reference to the building of a bridge across Savannah river between our counties. I am sending you some extracts from this presentment. They say among other things: "For several years it has been recognized as one of the urgent needs of two progressive counties that a substantial bridge, be constructed across Savannah river at or near one of the most direct public roads between Anderson and Hartwell, Georgia. "We are reliably informed that Hart county in Georgia is ready and willing to defray half the expense of building such a bridge, and we therefore unanimously recommend that the Anderson county delegation provide at the next session of the general assembly for the raising of sufficient funds by taxation to meet said bridge to be built as soon as practicable. We recommend that the board of county commissioners get in touch with the proper authorities of Hart county, Ga., and agree on the plan, cost and proposed location of said bridge and submit said information to the Anderson county delegation for action at the next session of the general assembly. "When will it suit you to meet me at one of the ferries on the river to discuss this proposition. Please let me know soon. "Respectfully, "J. Mack King, "Supervisor."

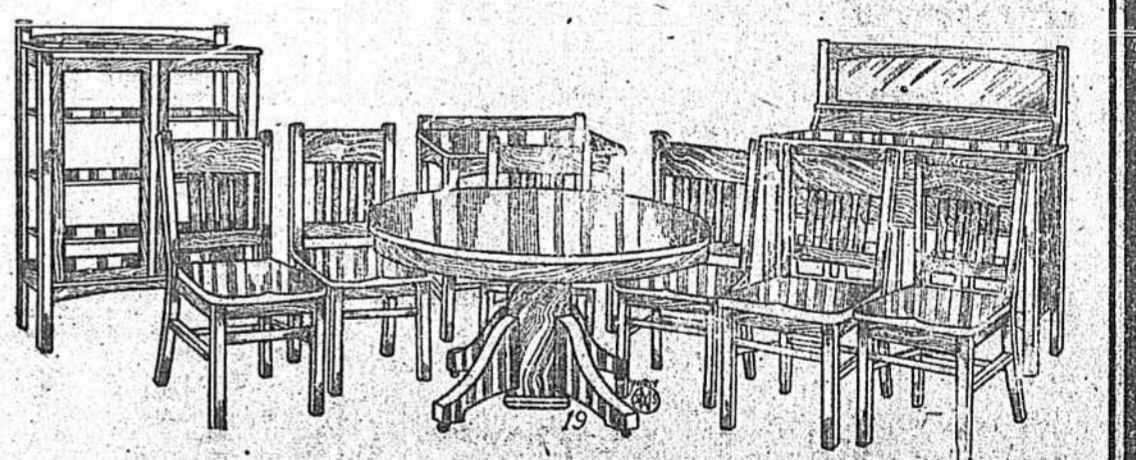
