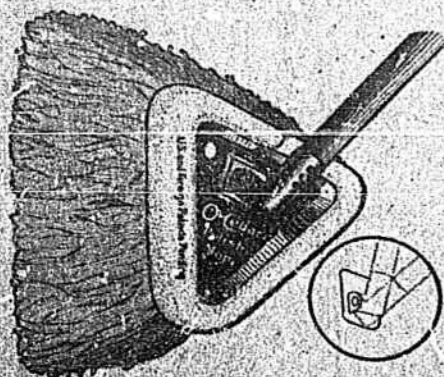

SUMMEY CASE STILL IN HANDS OF JURY

WILL RETURN SEALED VERDICT THIS MORNING AT 9:30 O'CLOCK

SOUND CALENDAR

Judge Moore Wishes to Clear Docket of Many Cases Which Are Already Settled.

The B. L. and Mrs. Willie Summey case for \$6,000, a suit against the county, was heard yesterday in civil court, it occupying nearly all day. Late yesterday afternoon the jury was charged and sent to the room with orders to return a sealed verdict Wednesday morning.

It will be remembered that this case has been heard twice before; the first resulting in the judge ordering a non suit, and the second in a verdict for the plaintiffs in the sum of \$2,500, from which an appeal was made.

In the case of Hannah Lovelace against H. B. Keese, the court directed a verdict for the plaintiff in the amount asked for, \$150. The defendant was not present.

To Clear Calendar.
Yesterday morning when court convened Judge Moore, after looking over the docket, announced that this morning when court reconvened, he would sound the calendar, and that he wished all members of the bar association present.

As the calendar now stands there are approximately 50 cases on docket. Some of these have been compromised or otherwise settled out of court, and Judge Moore is anxious to clear the calendar as much as possible.

COUNCIL TO CONSIDER LICENSE ORDINANCE

SPECIAL MEETING WILL BE HELD THIS AFTERNOON AT 3:30 O'CLOCK

POLICE FORCE

Dissension in This Department is to Be Investigated at This Time.

The first meeting of city council for the purpose of passing upon the license and supply ordinance will be held this afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, this time having been decided upon yesterday afternoon. One or two more special meetings will have to be held, before this matter is finished.

Reports of dissension on the police department having reached members of council, it was decided yesterday afternoon to have all of the members of the city police appear before the body this afternoon, at which time they will be given an opportunity to express the reasons for this dissatisfaction. It appears that there is some kind of internal trouble in this department and for the past few weeks various reports have been made to the members of council about it. At the beginning of the meeting this afternoon council will take up this question and thresh it out, so that in this department of the city's government, everything and everybody will be working in harmony like they are in the others.

AIKEN INTRODUCES RURAL CREDITS BILL

Washington, Dec. 7.—One of the most notable of the 2,000 bills introduced in the house of representatives Monday was that presented by Congressman Aiken of South Carolina to establish a system by which national banks may make loans on farm lands in the aid of agriculture.

When late last night the last bill and resolution introduced in the house was filed by the journal clerk's staff, the total was found to exceed 2,000, including about 1,500 private pension bills. All day the documents poured in until they overflowed the bill basket and covered the clerk's desk.

There were many national defense bills, settling forth mainly the personal views of representatives. Administration preparedness measures will come later. A bill introduced awaiting the organization of the military and naval affairs committees.

Punishing Children.
Rabbi Julius Silberfeld of the B'nai Abraham Temple, in High street, in addressing his congregation on the punishment of children, said, according to The Newark Star: "Many fathers punish their children too severely for a misdeed, and when this happens the child goes right back and does the same thing over again. I once knew a father that tried this plan on his son. One day the father whitewashed a pole in his yard and said to his son, 'Whenever you commit a deed that you know is wrong you are to drive a nail into the pole.' 'Some time after the boy came running to his father and explained that he had filled the pole and couldn't get another nail in edgewise. Father and son went of the pole together, and then the father asked the son what he was going to do.' 'Seeing his son had nothing to say, he suggested the boy pull out a nail whenever he did anything wrong, whereupon the son replied, 'Why not plant another pole, father?'"

What Red Cross Seals Do.
Every Red Cross Christmas Seal that is so is a real bullet in the fight against tuberculosis. These seals last year supported thousands of needy tuberculosis patients and to give them a chance for life. They provided for many visiting nurses, whose hundreds of thousands of visits brought instruction and cheer to numerous patients. They helped maintain dispensaries in scores of cities from the Atlantic to the Pacific where thousands of consumptive patients received free treatment, aid and advice. They provided the means to purchase millions of copies of circulars, pamphlets and other literature with which the public has been educated about tuberculosis. They have established and helped to maintain more than 500 open air schools for children who need open air treatment. These are just a few of the ways in which the \$55,000 received last year was expended. This year a million dollars is needed. Surely any one can help by buying at least ten seals!

SHOOTING FIREWORKS AND PLACING STANDS

THIS MATTER ATTENDED TO BY CITY COUNCIL YESTERDAY

ONLY TWO NIGHTS

To Shoot Fireworks, Beginning Christmas Eve and Lasting Till 12 O'clock P. M. Saturday.

At the regular monthly meeting of city council yesterday afternoon the matter of allowing the shooting of Christmas fireworks in the city of Anderson was brought up and discussed, the time limit being fixed from Friday night at 7 o'clock, December 24, until Saturday night following at 12 o'clock. The same regulations about bonfires on the pavements and near cotton warehouse is to be effective as last year.

According to the ordinance it will be unlawful to shoot fireworks before 7 o'clock on Friday evening and also to fire them after Saturday night at 12 o'clock. This will allow for two nights and it is thought that this will be sufficient. No bonfires will be allowed on any of the street paving and at no places except those by the chief of police's consent.

Displaying Wares.
To take effect immediately, it was decided that the merchants be allowed to display their wares on stands in front of their stores as heretofore, these stands to be erected to suit the regulations of the chief of police. This is the usual custom in Anderson and now since permission has been granted, doubtless numbers of stands will be erected within the next few days.
