NORWAY IS DEPENDENT ON ENGLAND FOR COAL

Christiana, Norway, Dec. 11.—Since Norway is at present dependent on England for its supply of coal and coke, that country has a great hold on Norwegian trade. Dealers in coal and coke are told by their English business connections that if they sell bunkers to steamers destined for Germany or with cargo supposed to find its way to Germany, they will be no longer furnished with English coal.

The other day the American freight steamer Maumes of New York with a cargo made up mostly of American pork arrived at Bergen to coal. It had to leave the place however without coal as all the dealers were warned by British authorities that if this steamer with supplies alleged to be destined for Germany, by way of Sweden, get bunkers by them, English coal sellers at once would stop trade connections with them.

England also has threatened to stop the great import to Norway of olive oil from Italy and Spain and sheet metal used in the canning industry, unless the Norwegian importers guarantee that no canned product to which such oil or tin is used, shall be exported to any of England's enemies, and many canning plants had to yield to this.

The country is full of "mercantile" spies, keeping watch of the export and import, reporting through their embassies or consulates or directly to the foreign office. It happens that old Norwegian firms, who for years have been trading in England, get letters from their English business connections that they cannot do business with them any longer, as a report from Norway says that they have "assisted German traders" or something like that, even though the report can be proved to have been without any foundation.

The Norwegian Press, commenting on this, calls the attention of the Norwegian government to the way England is trying to control Norwegian trade and industry and some Norwegian business men against selling their right of independence to England.

Even the English paper Economist has warned the British authorities against this trade policy, toward the Scandinavians and also says that "when Great Britain is neutral itself the Briton always is the first to claim the right for neutrals to do business with each other and with belligerents and always has protested against an extension of the contraband list to provisions and raw materials."

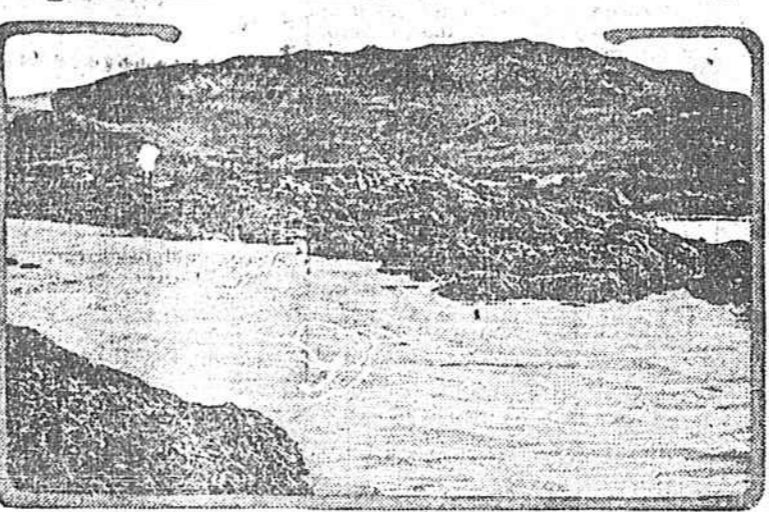

Along the CORNWALL COAST

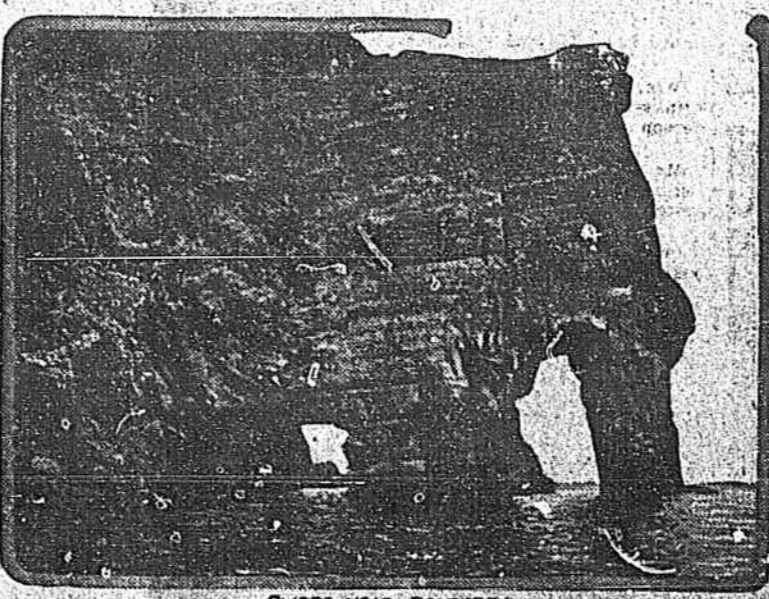


MOUTH OF THE TAMAR

THE quaint, delightful coast country of Cornwall, a favored haunt of peace and quietness, yet where some of the most important English naval stations are now busy, is described for the National Geographic society by Florence Craig Albrecht. At points along this coast, England holds concentrated great battle fleets. Here, west of Lands End, are the Scilly Islands, and beyond Cornwall, further up the channel, lies Plymouth, military harbor and great naval base. The charm of this old-fashioned, picturesque land of fisher folk and peasants is told by Mrs. Albrecht, who explored its coast before war clouds recalled a martial stir to Cornwall, for the society in the following bulletin:

"Here are rock and headland and cliff, now green, now golden with gorse, now bare and rugged; inlet bay and harbor, with berg and there an isolated house, a tiny village, a pretentious town; a great port. An unfriendly coast? Yes, with heavy seas and winds, with thick sea-fogs—a danger zone; rocks ever ready to tear holes in the stoutest vessel, currents ever ready to drive them on! But a picturesque coast; a wonderfully beautiful coast, both upon summer days and in winter storms; a coast with many harbors, none too easy of entrance, by reason of rocks and tides, and many impossible for any but the smallest craft."

All Have Splendid Memories. There are splendid memories remaining to all of these ports, the writer says, for too many fleets have sailed up and down the channel since history began not to have visited all these places with the task of making history. Fishing fleets have kept the foreground of the picture through later years, but signs of war preparation have never been absent from Cornwall's waters, and huge squadrons of grim, gray men-of-war have regularly come and gone and gathered there. The writer tells of Bertance, the sunny pleasure-loving little sea city where the most picturesque of plate types originated; of Newlyn, the home of the true old sort of fishermen, and the Mecca of artists; of Marazion, the old, which, according to Cornish history, was an important city visited by Phoenician merchants in the days of Ezekiel the prophet; of

"Well, I'll tell you what I'll do," resumed the doctor. "I will give you ten cents every day you don't tear your clothes off. Eh?"

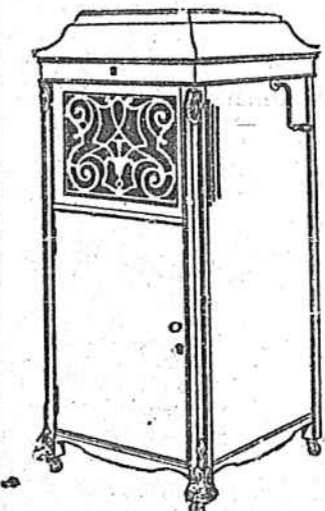
