COOPERATIVE PLAN FOR FEEDING CATTLE NATIONAL CAMPAIGN FOR COUNTRY SCHOOLS

STATE DEMONSTRATION AGENT LONG WAS HERE YESTERDAY

Secretary Lane in Annual Report Advises Benefits for Young America.

MANY CATTLE FED

Mr. Long Speaks Hopefully of New Work of Farmers This Season.

Mr. W. W. Long, state demonstration agent was in Anderson for a short while Tuesday afternoon, in company with Prof. Calvin of Clemson college. Mr. Long was seen at the office of the local demonstration agent, Mr. Byars, and talked about the cooperative feeding plan now being carried out in the state.

"We are now feeding about 4,000 head of cattle in South Carolina and the interest in the feeding plan is higher just now than at any other time in the past. Reports have been received from thirteen of the counties of the state and they show that 2,000 head are being fed in this manner. Considering the state comparatively, I would say that there is approximately 4,000 head now being properly fed and fattened for market."

Mr. Long commented on the Anderson farmers' work along these lines, and said that while it showed up well that it was not on the equal with the Greenville farmers. This is perhaps due to the fact that Greenville is one of the markets and Anderson is not.

"We have recently brought in the state some 190 head of breeding cattle, worth about \$12,000. That certainly looks good to me, and the more we bring in, the better off our farmers will soon be," continued Mr. Long. "The interest is at its height just now, and I hope it will stay that way."
