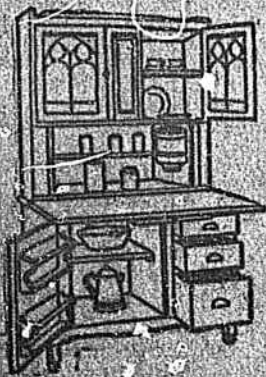

VOLUMINOUS REPORT ON COUNTY SCHOOLS

COUNTY SUPT. OF EDUCATION FELTON IS PREPARING BULLETIN

SCHOOL RECORDS

In Each School District Will Be Presented in Itemized Form.

One of the most extensive of all annual reports is being compiled in the office of Mr. J. B. Felton, county superintendent of education. The record of each school district is being made up in itemized form, and will make a book or pamphlet of some 100 or more pages.

The idea of getting out this report, which is to be made on the order of a bulletin and distributed, is to let each school teacher and trustee know how their school district compares with the other school districts. The pamphlets will be mailed out some time after the first of the year.

Each of the sixty-seven school districts in the county are taken up and the receipts and expenditures are itemized just to give an idea of what is really being done, the following will show how minute each report is. Each district has a separate page. The receipts are on one side, being itemized as follows:

Poll tax, dog tax, three mill tax, special tax, high school apportionment from state for term extension, from state for rural graded schools, from state for building, from county for building, from other sources. The expenditures are classed as follows: Salaries, fuel, incidentals, furniture and apparatus, repairs, rents, grounds and buildings, and library.

The figures for this bulletin are being taken from the annual report of the superintendent of education for the school session of 1914-15.

INCREASE IS ASKED IN APPROPRIATION

Washington, Dec. 14.—An increase of nearly three hundred per cent over the sum spent last year for big guns, coast fortifications and ordnance, is included in the general preparedness scheme asked for in the fortifications bill prepared by the war department. Last year six million was asked, this year, twenty-three million. The bill provides for eighteen new emplacements as compared with eight last year, and \$1,800,000 is asked for the purchase of sites for forts while three million is asked for ammunition for coast guns with authority to buy three million and a half more. It is proposed to obtain a patent for John Hayes Hammond, Jr., covering wireless control of torpedoes from shore stations and wireless control of torpedoes launched from aeroplanes. It asks authority to purchase ammunition from private manufacturers without advertising for bids with a view of fostering the development of private plants.

WOULD SUBSTITUTE VERDICT

New York Medicos Would Prevent Cases Like Thaw's.

New York, Dec. 14.—The substitution of a verdict of "not guilty" for a verdict of "guilty, but insane" for a verdict of "not guilty" to be rendered by juries where insane persons committed a crime was recommended by a committee of the society of Medical Jurisprudence in a report of that body.

It says the difference between the situation where a sane person is found "not guilty" and a person found to have committed a crime but who is insane. The report indicated that Thaw could have been returned to Matteawan had the proposed verdicts been possible.

RUNNING STREET CARS OVER NEW PAVEMENT

ON NORTH MAIN AS FAR AS TRIBBLE STREET

WILL SOON FINISH

Cars Are Expected to Run Through on North Main Next Week.

The same plan of running the street cars over the new pavement is being used on North Main street as was used on the other streets. The cars are being run further and further down Main street each day. The cars are running to Tribble street today and the regular schedules will be resumed some time next week. This will be a great burden on the shoulders of the traction company officials. There has been some interrupted service in the city for the past six months, and the street car officials, motormen and conductors, and especially the public will certainly be glad when the cars are running on all lines on regular schedules.

Anderson has been greatly inconvenienced by the continued transferring, necessitated by the car track paving, and with the end of this in sight, things appear much brighter to the man whose dinner depends on whether he can catch a street car to his home, and get back in an hour.

Other paving work is being pushed along satisfactorily. All asphalt work will be completed today, when the last of West Whitner street is finished. This has been one of the tedious jobs on Whitner street, due to the many crossings and intersections of tracks of the street railway and has taken considerable time. Only North Main street remains now to be completed and the paving contract will be done.

PRUNING FRUIT TREES IS ORDER OF THE DAY

DEMONSTRATION AGENT BYARS KEPT BUSY BY FARMERS

NOW RIGHT TIME

Mr. Byars Offers Services and Says Work Should Be Done Now.

According to demonstration agent, S. M. Byars, now is the proper time for pruning, trimming and spraying orchards, and farmers all over the county are doing these tasks each day. Mr. Byars says that he has been very busy assisting many of the farmers in this work, and that he is not through with all that he has proposed.

"I wish all the farmers would do this work right now," said Mr. Byars, "and those who do not know exactly what to do, and how to do it, would call me up and I will be more than glad to assist them in any way I can."

Mr. Byars was emphatic in his remarks that the amount of good coming from proper pruning and spraying that does not require a very unusual amount of skill, but a matter, which if not done right, may result in harm rather than in good. If the farmer does not know how to do the work for himself, it will be little trouble to call for Mr. Byars and he will come out to the place and help him out.

Mr. Byars said that besides regular office duties and his regular reports, his work is chiefly in the orchards just now.

M'CORMICK COUNTY CARRIED ELECTION

RAILROAD STATION NOT CHANGED TODAY
