CHRISTMAS DINNERS BY SALVATION ARMY

NEW PLAN OF COLLECTING FUNDS IS WORKING SATISFACTORILY

MORE IS NEEDED

Contributions Good But Must Be More to Give Dinners to All Anderson's Needy.

"We are well pleased with the response we are getting from our appeals for money for the annual Christmas dinner and for the Christmas tree," stated Capt. Knox of the Salvation Army yesterday. "However, this does not mean that we now have sufficient funds and do not need further contributions for we do. The system we are using, distributing envelopes on any street, one day and collecting them the next, is working splendidly, and it is doubtful whether we will resort to the 'Bell the Kettle' plan which is being used in so many other cities. We are also soliciting funds in Belton for a dinner in that town."

Capt. Knox and Guest have made themselves very familiar with conditions in Anderson since their assignment here and are well prepared to help only those who deserve and really need a Christmas dinner. They are kept busy making personal investigations so that none except the really needy will be served.

The Christmas dinner will be put up uncooked in a basket, the size being regulated by the number of people in the family. The baskets will contain Irish and sweet potatoes, chicken or beef, bread, sugar, coffee, vegetables and fruits. If the funds continue to be turned in as they have been in the past few days, those in charge state that they will be able to send out about 400 dinners.

The Christmas tree for the poor will be held in the army's headquarters on East Whittier street on Christmas Eve night, this time being more convenient to all parties concerned. Those invited will be deserving children and presents for them only will be placed on the tree.

SHIPPING GOOD

New Record Was Set in Spartanburg One Day Last Week—Short Visit.

"We are finding everything in splendid condition and business is good," stated Mr. E. T. Thompson, vice president and general manager of the Piedmont & Northern lines, who was in the city for a short time yesterday. "One day last week a record day was made in Spartanburg and a new record in shipping was made."

Mr. Thompson and Mr. E. W. Crosby, trainmaster, came to Anderson yesterday morning on an inspection tour, staying only a few minutes. They are completing their rounds and expressed themselves as being well pleased.

Mr. Thompson stated that he was glad to see that the paving work was nearing completion but did not state when the ticket office would be moved back to the ballroom building on North Main street. The remodeling of this building was completed some time ago and is ready for occupancy. It can not be stated how long it will be before the heavy interurban cars will be allowed on the track on North Main street since the weather conditions may be unfavorable and more time will have to be given the concrete paving to set.

ELECTRIC SIGNS

Campaign to Have More of Them Used By Merchants and Local Business Men.

A. V. Harrill, vice president of the Southern Public Utilities company was in the city yesterday morning, accompanied by C. A. Henley of Knoxville, Tenn., an electric sign expert, who came to Anderson to confer with Mr. A. E. Holman, who is in charge of the sign department of the local branch of the company. They returned to Charlotte, N. C., on the midday train. Mr. Henley is visiting all of the cities where the Southern Public Utilities company operates, and is making efforts to have more electric signs placed. As announced some time ago, the company is making a campaign in Anderson for the purpose of having more of the signs erected and the proposition is apparently taking well.

Mr. Harrill had not been a visitor in Anderson since 1883 and he was very much impressed with the city's size and progressiveness. He complimented the business district, stating that judging from the many pretty window displays the merchants here were as live as could be found anywhere. He stated that the paving was one of the best improvements that the city could have made and that its importance could not be estimated.

Mr. Harrill at one time pitched ball for a Charlotte team and some of the records he made then are well remembered by Anderson people.

YEARLY MEETING OF RY. STOCKHOLDERS

BLUE RIDGE OWNERS MET IN ANDERSON YESTERDAY

PRESIDENT HERE

H. W. Miller Arrived Early in Day on Private Car—No Important Announcements.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Blue Ridge railway company was held yesterday in the office of the company's attorneys, Messrs. Bonham, Watkins & Allen and all directors were re-elected except two young members who live in Raleigh, N. C. These two members were replaced by two young men of Atlanta, Ga., this city having become the headquarters since the death of Col. Andrews and Mr. H. W. Miller's election to the presidency. The only local member of the board, Mr. J. D. Vandiver, was re-elected. The only stockholders present were Mr. Vandiver, President Miller, who represented the Southern railway and Mr. C. D. Mackay of Atlanta, secretary of the Blue Ridge and all subsidiary lines of the Southern.

President Miller, accompanied by Mr. Mackay and Mr. E. P. Webb, private secretary, arrived in the city yesterday morning at 9:15 o'clock in a private car. After the meeting of the board of directors would be held later in Atlanta. The party left at 4:37 over the Charleston and Western Carolina railway for Augusta, Ga.

While in the city Mr. Miller stated that the work of ballasting the road-bed of the Blue Ridge would now go right ahead. He said that the rock would be hauled over the Southern from Alta, Ga. Mr. Miller also stated that the improvements on the Southern were progressing rapidly, especially between Greenville and Spartanburg, and between Gainesville and Cornelia in Georgia.

Aged Walhalla Man Died at the Home of His Daughter Here

Mr. Joseph C. Garrison, aged 64, died Friday morning at the home of his son-in-law, Mr. John Knox who lives near Anderson. Mr. Garrison suffered a slight stroke of paralysis about two weeks ago and he never recovered from this attack. He came to the home of his daughter and of Monday the second attack came. He died yesterday morning at 4 o'clock. Arrangements were made to take the body to his home in Walhalla, the funeral will probably be held there this morning.
