"Everywoman."
 Many plays of many kinds have won success, but it is doubtful whether there has been another produced more subtly significant, more deeply impressive, or more wonderful in its appeal to the senses than the dramatic spectacle, "Everywoman," which Henry W. Every character in the play is symbolic of some abstract virtue or vice or condition with relation to the life of woman. It is declared to be the shrewdest analysis of human nature ever presented upon the stage, and combined with wonderful pictorial embellishment drives home its lesson with telling force. An entire symphony orchestra accompanies the organization which is Mr. Savage's finest.
