HOLIDAY RUSH NOW ON AT POSTOFFICE

POSTMASTER STATES ALL PACKAGES BE DELIVERED ON TIME

MAIL VERY HEAVY

Carrier Department Increased and More Equipment is Being Used for Work.

The rush properly began at the local postoffice yesterday morning when the Christmas packages began to pour in by the hundreds, and will continue throughout this week, growing heavier every day. By doubling the equipment and the regular clerks working over time, and with additional help in the carrier delivery department in the way of wagons and men, the postmaster will take care of the situation. It was stated yesterday that all packages for local delivery would reach everyone on time.

As compared with last year, the indications are that the department will do much larger business, this being attributed largely to the more progressive spirit that is abiding throughout the country.

Yesterday afternoon when The Intelligencer reporter was at the postoffice, there were sixty-five pouches on the rack, and each one was rapidly being filled with packages for foreign delivery. All tables around the clerks which were assigned to this work, were filled with packages waiting to be put into the pouches which will carry them to their respective destinations. This is a quick eye, and a ready memory is necessary to do this work, can readily be seen by one watching the way they put the packages into the various pouches.

Although a great many packages for Christmas delivery have already been mailed, the greater part of them still remain to be put into the postoffice and the clerks and their assistants will certainly have their hands full until after the holidays.

PROFITS IN PRUNING SHEARS

Judicious Use of Saw and Shears at This Season Will Enhance Tree's Value Greatly.

Clemson College, Dec. 20.—This is the season for pruning. Most of the profits in fruit trees are in the pruning tools and unless a man treats his orchard well in winter it will not treat him well the following summer. Orchards should be gone over this winter, before the buds begin to swell in spring, and thoroughly pruned. Systematic and careful pruning every year greatly prolongs the life and increases the value of a tree. Any one who has any questions to ask fruit trees should write to the horticultural division of Clemson college.

In pruning, begin by removing all dead and undesirable branches. Thin out the remaining branches so that the sun can enter freely and shorten back the branches that have a tendency to grow too long.

A healthy tree usually sets more fruit than it can support. One of the best ways to thin this is by pruning in winter. General thinning of branches with fruit during the bearing months is due to improper pruning. This is especially true of peaches.

Prune carefully. Cutting off a few limbs with an axe is not pruning, but tree butchery. Leave the axe at the house. Remove large limbs with a saw, cutting so close to the trunk that the wound will heal while the limb is still attached. Small limbs are easily removed with hand shears.

Farmers should never wait until late spring to prune. At that orchard is likely to be neglected. Now is the best time of year for this work.

RUNAWAY RESULTS IN INJURIES TO TWO

FOSTER MARTIN IS IN COUNTY HOSPITAL—ELLIOTT McCANTS HURT

MULE RAN AWAY

Became Frightened at Automobile and Ran Into McCants Mail Wagon.

Mr. Foster Martin is in the county hospital suffering from wounds received yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock when his mule became frightened at an automobile and ran away on North McDuffie street. Mr. Elliott McCants, one of the city carriers, was also injured when he was knocked against the pavement at the same time.

It seems that Mr. Martin's mule became frightened at an automobile driven by Mr. Theo. Watson, and began tearing down the street. After running some distance, the buggy struck Mr. McCants mail wagon, just as he was stepping out to deliver some mail. The jar threw Mr. McCants to the ground, his head striking the pavement. He received severe bruises back of his left ear but medical assistance was rendered and he was soon able to be taken home.

In the meantime, Mr. Martin, who was still in his buggy, was kicked in his forehead by the mule, which had finally broken loose from the vehicle. When Mr. Martin was found he was unconscious and he was severely cut on the forehead. He was taken to the county hospital where physicians found it necessary to take ten stitches in his wounds. There was another occupant of the buggy, but he escaped practically unharmed.

It is said that the whole affair was unavoidable. The mule after becoming frightened, was uncontrollable, and Mr. Martin was unable to hold him. Mr. Martin is a resident of the Six and Twenty section of the county.

EUGENE SHAW GIVEN 10 DAYS LONGER HERE

GOVERNOR MANNING TOOK ACTION IN MATTER LAST NIGHT

HAD LEAVE STATE

By December 20, Under Sentence Received at Last Term of Criminal Court.

Mr. Leon E. Rice, attorney, last night received a telegram from Governor Manning stating that the time in the case of Eugene Shaw, who had to leave the state for his trial this month (yesterday) had been extended from that date until January 1, this being done to allow Shaw to further wind up some of his business affairs in this county.

It will be remembered that Eugene Shaw, along with several other members of the same family, plead guilty in the last term of criminal court to violations of the dispensary law, and in each instance, excepting one, the sentence was a term of 12 months, or a fine of \$500 or to leave the state by December 20. It is understood that all of the other defendants have already left the state.

This action of the governor was taken with the consent of the solicitor of this county.
