## VETERANS DESIRE TO HAVE BILL ENACTED

WHICH WILL RESULT IN PAYMENT SPECIFIED SUMS TO SOLDIERS

### WRITE AN APPEAL

Many Have Been Deprived of Pension Because Had Small Income Over Requirements.

The Confederate veterans of Anderson county want a special bill enacted by the legislature which will give all of the old soldiers and their widows a certain amount every year, and they wish to have drafted a petition which will be presented at the approaching session of the general assembly.

The veterans desire something in tangible form and a bill that will be passed and go into operation immediately after it is enacted. Both widows and the veterans are fast passing away and they need this money now. There are numerous old soldiers and widows living here in Anderson who need some help, now in their old age, but who cannot get a pension from the state because they have an income of over \$75, some possibly have as much as the magnificent sum of a hundred dollars a year, and this debar them from any assistance from the state. This is said to be one reason that \$1,000 was returned recently of pension money, which should have been given to worthy veterans of this county, and the money left here, because they had a few dollars more than the law said they must have, they were deprived of all help.

The veterans want this, not so much as a pension, but as a reward of merit, and they deserve every reward and consideration that can be bestowed upon them.

This is the form of their communication:

An Appeal in Behalf of the Confederate Soldiers and Their Widows:

We have in Anderson county a number of Confederate soldiers, and widows of Confederate soldiers, who have been deprived of a pension from the state for the reason that they had a small amount of income over the requirement by the state. We think this is not equitable and just to our old comrades and their widows.

Therefore, we have determined, through our representatives in the legislature, to have a law enacted to give to those not on the pension list a pension to be paid by special levy on the county.

It is therefore necessary to find out the number of Confederate soldiers and widows in the county, whose names are not on the pension list, and we ask all of the Confederate soldiers and widows in the county whose names are not on the pension list, to send Comrade R. F. Dwyer, Anderson, S. C., on or before December 31st, their names and the name of their command they served in, and the widows send the names and commands of their husbands.

## New British Commander



General Sir Douglas Haig.

Hailed as the "man of the hour," General Sir Douglas Haig succeeded Sir John French as commander of the army in France and Flanders on Dec. 16th. General Haig is only 43, four years old, the youngest commander in the present war. He is a Scotsman, born in Fifeshire, is tall, powerfully built, dour and masterful, and so close a student of his profession that he was nicknamed "von Haig" by his friends.

## Submarine Prophet Wins Fortune.

No more interesting tale of war-won fortune can be found than that of the late Isaac L. Rice in the January issue of *Life*. He began investing in submarine stock when von Toltz was figuratively in his swaddling clothes and the Carriage Place Palace, free from spiders, brooded over the world like the Roc's egg. At the beginning of the war Mr. Rice was almost a pauper in spite of the fact that he had made two previous fortunes. Today he leaves \$3,500,000 and might have quadrupled that sum.

Years ago Mr. Rice was a very wealthy man. He had the distinction of importing the first automobile into this country. He owned the controlling interest in most of the automobile concerns in America and a palace on Riverside Drive. The panic of 1907 knocked him out. He lost everything but his palace. He sold that and put the proceeds into a moribund concern called the Electric Fuel company, whose own employees refused to purchase stock at the princely figure of \$10 a share. Two months after the war broke out, employees were still refusing to buy stock and shareholders were getting rid of it with signs of relief. Nobody had any faith in the Electric Fuel company except Mr. Rice. When the demand for submarines grew intense and the shares jumped to \$50 he thought it was time to begin to unload his shares upon a clamoring public. He won three and a half million but showed bad judgment for the stock soon jumped to \$500 a share. When he was rich again Mr. Rice invested his fortune in government bonds.

## A Hog's Cafeteria.

"A cafeteria, or self-feeding, plan by which hogs make greater gains in a shorter time and at a less cost than when fed by a feeder," is described in *Farm and Fireside*, the national farm paper published in Springfield, Ohio. "No matter how experienced and first-class the feeder may be, says the animal husbandry department of the Iowa State College of Agriculture, with a long record of experiments to back up the claim, the cafeteria is better."

"The only objection to the plan is that it shows that the hogs have more sense than the scientists," declared Dean C. E. Curtiss, announcing the matter. It does, indeed, prove that the hog is not the hog that he has been held up to be. While he does not choose his food with any regard to price—looking down the left-hand side of the menu rather than the right-hand side, where the prices are set forth—he does choose it with regard to the greatest gains to himself in a perfectly balanced ration which surpasses anything the scientists have ever discovered. "Truly the hog does not like to have any more than the average human being," says Prof. John M. Ervord, who devised the self-feeder. "Hog-feed hogs, even when given the best of care, do not do as well as self-fed hogs, which make gains equal to or other the selection of the white pants by a wash of cheap feeds and gorges on the high-priced morsels."

## PRISONERS ALLOWED HOME FOR CHRISTMAS

MAYOR GODFREY YESTERDAY COMMUTED SENTENCES OF NINE

### ONE WHITE MAN

Time of All Except One About Been Served--Some on Gang, Others County Home.

Mayor Godfrey yesterday morning commuted the sentences of nine city convicts serving time on the county chancery or at the county home. This action was taken to allow the prisoners to go to their homes to spend the Christmas holidays, and the sentences are suspended during good behavior. All of the sentences of these convicts except one lack only a few days of being out. Those affected by this action are: Robert Killion, Dudley Sanders, Andrew Allen, Christine Smith, John Foggy, Perry Williams, Andrew Jones, Will Chapman and John Ramsey. All of them are negroes except one.

## FOR BETTER CONTROL MERCANTILE MARINE

London, Dec. 21.—The latest and fourth plan of the government for the better control of the British mercantile marine, while still unrepealed is practically a dead letter.

Beginning with a sweeping plan for the requisitioning of the entire mercantile marine, the government ran through various plans of lesser control until it reached an agreement whereby two committees of shipowners were appointed to provide for the requisitioning and licensing of British ships. The first committee was expected to meet the complaints of owners who claimed to be suffering great hardship because the admiralty in requisitioning ships always seized vessels, which had English home ports, while ships which traded between foreign ports escaped government service. The second committee was instructed to cooperate with the first by instituting a system whereby all British ships engaged in trade between foreign ports must have a license to continue in such business.

Neutral traders looked upon the advertised intentions of this second committee with great alarm, but nothing has occurred to justify their misgivings of a general disorganization of foreign commerce which depended on British bottoms for its conveyance. No change has taken place; vessels with home ports continue to suffer from arbitrary requisition by the admiralty, while no British ship engaged in trade between foreign ports has been refused a license. Such licenses have become a mere formality and are issued without question to any owner applying for them.

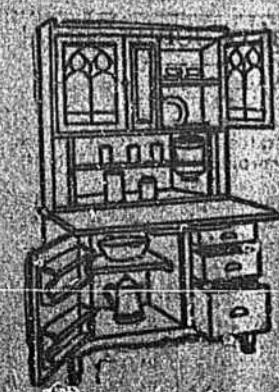
