MODERN COTTON MILLS TO BE BUILT IN CHINA

Tien-Tsin, China, Dec. 21.—Contracts have been signed with a Massachusetts concern for \$900,000 worth of machinery for the establishment of two modern cotton spinning mills here. The mills are to have 25,000 spindles, and are to be capable of expansion to double that number after sufficient labor has been trained.

This is the first time that American cotton manufacturing machinery has been sold in China in large quantities. Heretofore the Chinese manufacturers have looked to Europe, and frequently have bought second-hand machinery from Japan. It was through the effort of Julian H. Arnold, the American commercial attaché at Peking, that the American manufacturers were persuaded to enter into competition in the sale of machinery for the two mills.

China imports annually about \$28,000,000 worth of cotton yarn, chiefly from India and Japan. There are probably about 1,200,000 spindles in China operated in twenty-five mills, but the cotton consuming power of the Chinese would probably justify twenty times as many spindles. The department of commerce and agriculture has recently invited J. N. Johnson of the Texas Agricultural Experimental station to come to China to show the natives how to grow better cotton, and it is expected this expert will be here in January.

Most of the cotton now raised in China is from inferior seeds. In some sections of the Yang-tse valley American missionaries have imported high-grade seed and enabled the natives to grow a better variety of cotton. While there is a considerable acreage in North China, the conditions are not exactly favorable and the plant has a stunted growth.

Cotton is used almost exclusively by the coolie class in North China for clothing. With the approach of cold weather, the coolies who have been naked to the waist during the summer, gradually pile on heavy cotton garments padded with quilted cotton. Woolen cloth is beyond the coolie's purse. As the severe winter approaches the Chinese of the poorer class become rounder and rounder in appearance. Many of the children are so thickly wadded with cotton that the lines of their bodies are entirely obscured.

How to Win an Annual Income.

This is no pipe dream for it is backed by the American Bankers' Association and described in the January American Magazine:

"Suppose a man earning \$23 a week went to the American Bankers' Association to find out about their plan to give him an income of \$1,000 a year. When he told them he could save \$5 a week they would send him to a savings bank.

"He would place his \$5 and get a pass book. At the end of six months he would be credited with \$130. By the end of the year he would have \$262.60, by depositing \$5 weekly and drawing four per cent after six months.

"At this very interesting time, he would consult the cashier of the savings bank and tell him that he wished to draw \$1,000 and invest it in a safe real estate mortgage paying 6 per cent interest. The cashier would tell him at once where to go to get the investment and just how to make it.

"Having made the investment, at the end of the fourth year of his saving, the young man would look forward to saving, the first six months of the fifth year, the following: First, of course, his regular weekly deposit of \$5, of \$130; second, the six months' interest at 4 per cent on \$433.59 (the amount left after he had drawn out \$1,000), which would amount of \$24.46; third, the interest at 6 per cent, earned by his real estate mortgage, or \$30. This would make a total of \$162.46, added to the \$123.39 left in the bank after drawing out the \$1,000 and the total would amount to \$286.35. By the end of the fifth year, this sum would have increased to \$462.08—almost half enough to buy another \$1,000 mortgage with.

"The tracing of the growth of this man's savings would prove very fascinating reading, but it is too lengthy for these columns. At any rate, he would be able to buy his second \$1,000 mortgage at the end of the seventh year. After this, the interest earnings on his bank deposits and on his two mortgages would amount to more than half of his weekly saving from his salary.

"It would not be very long after this, before he would reach a point where he could buy the \$1,000 mortgage with greater frequency. If he continued the plan for twenty-five years he would own fourteen mortgages and have a bank account amounting to \$761.23. By using the accumulated interest on these two, together with the regular \$5 weekly saving, he would at this time be able to buy a \$1,000 mortgage every six months.

"By this time he would have reached his forty-seventh year, provided he started saving when he was twenty-two. Suppose he continued until he was fifty years of age. At this time, he would own \$17,000 in 6 per cent mortgages, and have a bank account amounting to \$779.23. He could easily retire then. Figure the income from \$17,000 capital. Four per cent a year on \$69.32 would amount to \$693.76. Six per cent a year on \$17,000 is \$1,020. Add them, and you find that he receives an annual income of \$1,713.76 on \$17,000 a year's work."

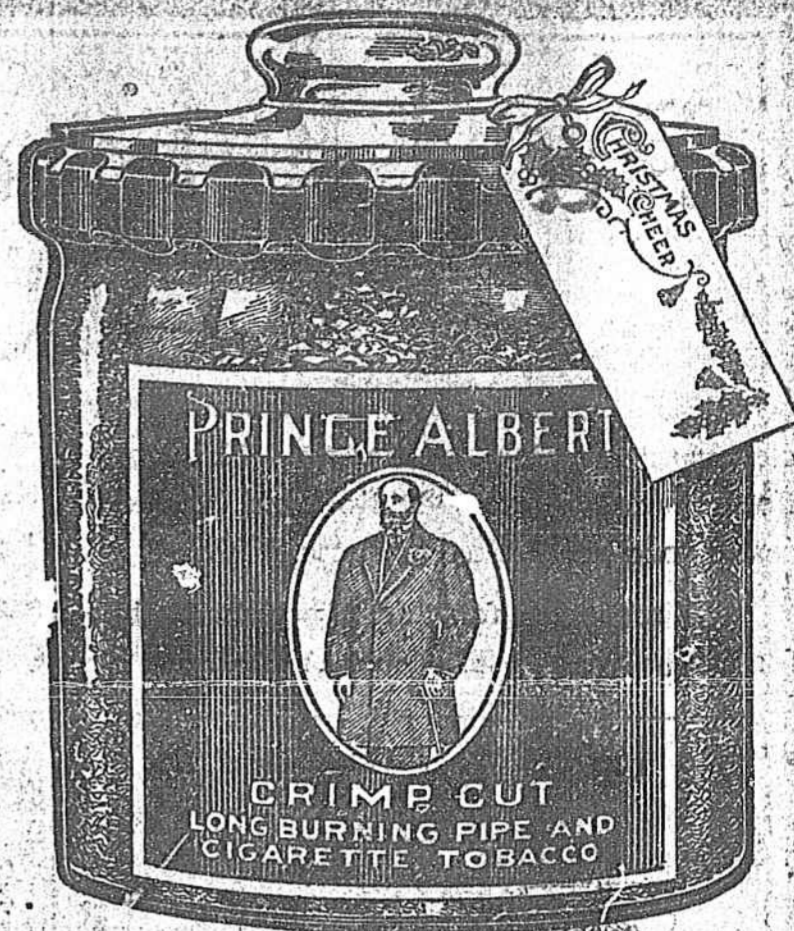
