TWO YOUNG BOYS  
INVOLVED IN FIGHT  
WERE TRIED YESTERDAY BEFORE MAGISTRATE GEIGER  
SHOTGUN USED  
One Secured Shotgun and Fired Over Other's Head—Suspended Because of Age.

Leva Burton and John Jones, two young white boys, were tried before Magistrate Geiger yesterday morning, the former on the charge of assault and battery and the latter for assault with intent to kill. Fines were suspended during good behavior. Neither one of the boys were over 14 years of age, and were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Hilliard in one of the mill villages near the city. It appears that they got into a fight and Jones ran home. Burton was right in behind him, throwing rocks and bricks, some of which went into the house. Jones then went into the house and got a shotgun. He came out on the porch and fired the gun, the load going just above Burton's head. Owing to the age of the boys, the sentences were suspended.

PATRONS OUGHT TO ANSWER THE WHISTLE  
ARE DELAYING MAIL DELIVERY BECAUSE POSTMAN WAITS  
A TWO-HORSE DRAY Was Put into Service Yesterday in Order That All of Mail Might Be Delivered.

"If the patrons would respond to the postman's whistle quicker, they would do much toward helping us deliver this Christmas mail," stated Postmaster Laughlin yesterday afternoon. "Many of the people have no boxes for their letters and packages and the postman has to stand and wait until someone comes and gets them for he cannot afford to leave them in the porch. If all of the patrons would answer the whistle as soon as possible, it would save about two hours of the carrier's time." The Christmas mail in Anderson is very heavy. Yesterday a two-horse dray for delivering the mail was put into service, and in spite of this, the carriers and their teams have all they can possibly do. The delivery business has been increasing steadily for the past few days, and today and tomorrow will be the largest of this season. Christmas Day not being a legal holiday, the postoffice will not be closed and will remain open all day. Both city and rural deliveries will be made.

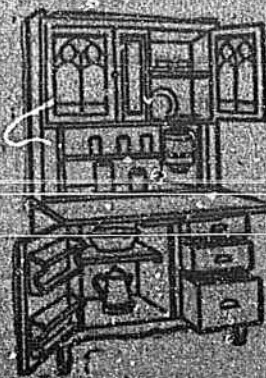
